Treasurer's Report:

Leonard Zumstein reports a bank balance of \$4399.46 and \$275.00 cash on hand for a total of \$4674.46.

The Form 28 filed that shows beginning cash balance of \$4,016.87, with \$720.00 in dues /contributions collected. For the March 15, 2023 luncheon, we took in \$1,590.00. We paid the luncheon caterer, Nicholau Farms, \$1,355.41 and \$275.00 for the rental of the hall.

\$46.58 – Badges and Cookies (for January meeting) Greg Back The Treasurer's Report was passed unanimously with a 1st by Gary Toombs and a 2nd by Fred Courter.

Secretary's Report:

Fred Courter reported he will change the date of the Dine Out in the newsletter from March 23, 2023, to March 30, 2023. Dine Out will be at Vito's Restaurant.

A motion was made by Gary Toombs and a second by Bob Holly to accept the change. Motion passed.

Membership:

Larry Hughes reported we had 46 members present at the March 15, 2023, luncheon with 72 members absent. The attendance included: the guest speaker, an invited guest and Jeff Chin. Memories from the past - Part 2

Later in the 1940's mom and dad always rolled their own cigarettes by hand. Plus we grew some vegetables our self and we also had chickens to eat. During the war many things were being rationed like, tires, some food items, and cigarettes. Mom and dad got chits to help purchase the items they needed. Also, we were very happy when dad came home with a box of wood from a job site.

There was a day, I don't know when, maybe when we were about 5 or 6 years old, Our mom found us in the gutter in the front of our house, sleeping! She didn't like that to well, after all what would the neighbors think, "don't they have beds?"

When we were a little older, say 7 or 8, we got into bigger toys like bikes and scooters. (We think we invented the scooter). It was made with a 4' piece of lumber 2 X 4 with skate wheels we found at the dumps again (we spent a lot of time at the dumps, maybe two or three Saturdays a month). The skates were built in 3-pieces. The front of the skates with wheels attached and the rear part of the skates with the wheels attached and a connecting channel between the front and back. We would nail them to the underside of the 3' 2 X4. We then would go to the market to get a wooden box that oranges came in. (They didn't come in cardboard boxes then). We would stand the box on end and nail it to the top of the 2X4, then we would put a 2X2 piece of wood on top of the orange crate for a handle bar. We would skate all over the neighborhood racing them.

We also invented the first cell phones. We put two cans with holes in the bottom of each can, and a string between them and pulled it tight. Then one of us would walk around the corner of the house until the string was tight, and then we could talk to each other. It was fun!

There was another time maybe we were 4. Dad was laying down outside on the driveway. We thought he was playing with us, so we started to jump up and down on him until mom came out and said what's going on here? We don't know, he fell to the ground? He actu-

ally fainted for some reason, we thought he was playing. What did we know

We would also make our own bikes. We had to build them from the frame, up. I don't remember ever getting a new bike because of the expense. So, whenever we went to the dumps with our dad, which was two miles away from our home, we would rummage through the stuff and find what we needed, be it frames, tires, wheels, handle bars, seats or even fenders. It might have taken a few trips, but we always found our parts. (Today it would be too dangerous to send kids walking all over the place and to the dump). It was a different time then, believe me. There was no crime that we knew of, there wasn't as many people or cars then also.

Most families had one car, because the man of the house was the only wage earner then. Things were quite different then, times were good even though we didn't have much.

Times started changing a couple of decades later. There were not a lot of people then living in East Palo Alto. (By the way, our house is still there on Ralmar Avenue). We walked or rode our bikes everywhere we went, even to downtown Palo Alto or to the corner grocery store that was only about a mile away. Anyway, we had a pretty good bike when we got done putting them together. They weren't pretty, but they got us around, until something broke, then it was back to the dump to find a part.

Another thing we would do is go fishing. It wasn't fishing like you guys know it today. It was almost like the caveman days. Our fishing gear consisted of a long stick with some fishing line we found at the dump. It was wound around the stick with a hook and a large weight and a jar of Potzkies salmon eggs (no real bait like Power- Bait today). Then we were in business. In those day we would go to the Bay, just east of our house or to a creek in Palo Alto to fish.


