Jeff is a homegrown success story.

He grew up on a dairy east of Denair, learning the value of hard work at a young age. He excelled as a student and athlete at Turlock High, where he set his sights on an appointment to the U.S. Military Academy, which he earned in 1990.

The rigor of West Point provided the foundation for Jeff's adult life, one dedicated to serving his country. He became an Army Ranger and commanded paratroopers at Fort Campbell, Ky., and Fort Lewis, Wa., earning the respect of his soldiers and his superiors for his leadership skills. By the time he left active duty in 1999, he had been promoted to captain.

He returned to Stanislaus County and helped to manage his family's 550-acre farm. But after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, Jeff felt a call and an obligation to return to the military. He joined the California National Guard and was put in command of an infantry company, D/1-184 Infantry, headquartered in Oakdale.

In 2005, the 184th was deployed to Iraq and given responsibility for a sector in the Baghdad suburbs. They dealt with insurgents on a daily basis. Jeff spent nearly a year in Iraq, earning a prestigious Bronze Star for his leadership.

Many of the soldiers Jeff served with had ties to law enforcement. They encouraged him to pursue that as a career. In 2007, he was hired as a deputy by the Stanislaus County Sheriff's Department. It was the only job he applied for. This area was his home and he wanted to serve the people who live here.

At the Sheriff's Department, Jeff developed a reputation for lead-

ership and vision. He began as a patrol deputy, but quickly was promoted. He became a STING detective, a rural crimes detective, a patrol sergeant and an internal affairs sergeant. He also supervised the Explorers for several years and developed an intern program to bring high school graduates into the department at age 18.

moted to lieutenant and placed in charge of police

services in Patterson. As police chief of one of the county's fastestgrowing and most vibrant cities, he leads a force of 28 deputies, sergeants and support staff.

Sheriff Jeff Dirkse was born in Southern California and raised in Denair. He graduated from Turlock High School in 1990 and the United States Military Academy at West Point, NY, in 1994, with a Bachelor's of Science degree. He subsequently served in the US Army as an Infantry Platoon Leader, Ranger Platoon Leader, Infantry Company Commander and most recently was a Watch Officer at Special Operations Command, Europe.

CASTLE AIR MUSEUM

Castle Air Museum represents history in a way the whole family can share. While there is nothing glamorous about war, our majority warbids are any importing reminders of how flagale our freedom, can be and how most and women have stepped forward when that freedom was threatened.

A visit to the Castle Air Museum gives visitors a peck into the past and lends analytic into the evolution of aircraft and the past misesoness of aircraft, and offers visitors of all ages a glimpse of what the fature of aerospace might hold.

Our collection encompanies tearly seventy restored vistage military aircraft ranging from pre-WWII to the persons on approximately resemy acros of beautifully-montained grounds. In addition is the outdoor displays the museum is complemented by an indice numerous which because a fascinating collection of warrant memorabilis including sincertal artifacts, military unforms, historic photos, and personal military artifacts from the post century.

The Foundation has relied mainly on volunteers to restore and maintain the aircraft. The current site was obtained by the Foundation after the closure of Castle Air Fouce Ruor. The Foundation opensors manurous guidale svents and works with a variety of youth organizations and schools.

The aircraft on display at Carle Air Museam are as much a part of America's heritage as Independence Hall and the Bettlefield at Gettysburg. Yet only a handful of these flying testimonials to our country's devention to democracy have survived decades of neglect and the salvage torch.

The United States Air Force's Heritage Program was instituted in order to preserve the few remaining examples of these sizerals for neutrons.

Accepting the challenge of restoring, maintaining, and displaying World War II. Korean War, and Victours Conflict aircraft, a group of dedicated enthusiasts in the Advates-Merced area formed the Cande Air Misseum Franchiston in 1981. It was their dream to build a moment no exhibit restored bistoric aircraft for public enjoyment.



Wine Investigation for Novices and Oenophiles (W.I.N.O.)



The Best Wines of the California State Fair Wine Competition

246 of California's finest wineries entered 1,846 wines in America's oldest and most esteemed wine event dating back to 1854. The California State Fair Wine Competition has celebrated the Best of the Golden State for over 169 years. I reported in my last column that Jeff Runquist Wines won the 2023 Golden State Winery of the Year, following previous victories in 2011 and 2019. Thirty-nine world-class judges also awarded a total of 19 Best of Region Awards, 20 Best of California Awards, a Best Value Award and 3 Best Micro Winery Awards. In total: 129 Double Gold, 309 Gold, 801 Silver and 478 Bronze medals were awarded.

I discovered a Spanish blend made with 70% Monastrell and 30% Garnacha at Trader Joe's for just \$5.95. The 2020 La Cueva De La Culpa is a big wine with a small price for an organically grown Mourvedra/Grenache blend. I call it a steal. I also picked up a few Moon series whites for summer sipping, all in the \$5-6 range. Moon label wines are made by a family owned valley winery exclusively for Trader Joe's. By the way, why isn't there a Trader Joe's located somewhere/anywhere between Modesto and Fresno? I thought UC Merced would be a good motivator, but no. Well, my vote goes to Livingston or maybe Atwater or Turlock? Cheers!
