Independence Day, the Fourth of July, is one of our most important national holidays but here are some things about our holiday that you may not know...

-One of the greatest misconceptions of the 4th of July lies in the name and date. It is widely believed that America declared its independence from Britain on July 4, 1776. However, the official vote actually took place two days before and the "Declaration" was published in papers on July 4.

-George Washington celebrated the 4th of July in 1778 even though he was at war. On July 4, 1778, George Washington treated U.S. soldiers to a double ration of rum and a cannon salute.

-July 4th was not deemed an official federal holiday until 1870, nearly 100 years after the nation was founded.

- -According to the National Sausage and Hot Dog Council (NHDSC), Americans are expected to eat 150 million hot dogs over the July 4th holiday. This is part of an estimated 7 billion that are expected to be eaten during the summer season from Memorial Day to Labor Day.
- -The Nathan's Famous 4th of July hot dog eating contest began over a century ago. According to the company itself, the first unofficial contest took place on July 4th, 1916. The contest, which began with four immigrants competing to determine who was the most patriotic, ended up becoming one of the most widely known July 4th traditions in America.

#### Wine Thoughts and Odd Lots

I think California's newest American Viticultural Area (AVA) has, without a doubt, the coolest name. The Federal Government approved the AVA as the San Luis Obispo Coast. They also allowed the nickname, 'SLO Coast' to be used as an official AVA name. It's not just a very cool name but it has the coolest temperatures of all California's AVAs. The majority of acreage is planted within six miles of the ocean. Bordered by the Santa Lucia Mountains on the east and the Pacific Ocean on the west, it's a 60 mile narrow strip of coastline from San Simeon to Santa Maria Valley. If you've ever spent some time in San Luis Obispo, the 'SLO Coast' is a fitting name and oh, so cool.

#### **Lucy 2021 Pico Blanco**

The Pisoni Family Vineyards of Monterey are adding a new wine to their Lucy brand this Spring. You're probably familiar with their Lucy Rose', which they have produced for18 years. Over those years, the Rose has raised almost \$150,000 for breast cancer research. The new white wine is called Pico Blanco, named for a mountain peak in the Santa Lucia Highlands in Monterey County. The wine is a blend of Pinot Gris (70%) and Pinot Blanc (30%) and a tribute to Monterey's history as a cool-climate growing region. Pico Blanco also gives the Pisoni family

the opportunity to contribute to a new cause close to their hearts: Ocean Conservancy. The family hopes to make the same impact on our oceans as they have for breast cancer research. Cheers! to Pisoni Family Vineyards.

#### **Cheers to Beer?**

Does your partner love wine and you love beer? They want to go to Napa Valley but you don't? Here is a little secret. There are more than a dozen breweries, micro breweries and watering holes that serve craft beers between American Canyon and Calistoga. That's a 35 mile ale trail for you to experience. The city of Napa has 9, St. Helena 2, Calistoga 2 and American Canyon 1. You can find a really neat map of the Napa Valley Ale Trail by going to visitnapavalley.com. If your partner asks about your new interest in Napa Valley, just say, "I understand Napa Cabs are terrific this year".


