# SIR OF THE MONTH ED GAVIGAN

Ed Gavigan was born in San Francisco in 1922. A local product of California, he was raised in San Francisco, attended school from the early grades through Poly Technique High School, graduating with the Class of 1941. He majored in commercial subjects giving him skills and competence in office work, such as filing, typing, and short hand. These, we will learn,

came in very important later. His sport was Track; a speedster in the 100 and the 200 yard dashes. During his senior year, his team won the conference.

Before the year was out, before he even got his feet on the ground from high school, the War started. As Ed tells it, "My mom went with me to the recruiting station to join the Navy!" He was in the Navy a short few weeks after signing up and found himself going through Boot Camp in San Diego. That only lasted a few weeks. He was shunted up to Bremerton, WA where he was assigned to an aircraft carrier, the USS Nassau. Almost immediately, the carrier sailed down to Alameda, picked up a full complement of aircraft and crews and was on its way to Pearl Harbor. Ed says that as they were sailing slowly into Pearl, he saw the pumping action in the attempt to raise the Battleship USS Oklahoma, one of several somber images he carries with him today.

From Hawaii it was out across the Pacific to New Caledonia where began a series of War ad-



ventures few have ever witnessed. Ed, bolstered by his 'office' education, was assigned to an important record keeping role, accounting for all aircraft, their disposition, crew assignments, their mission records, losses along with accident reports and pilot flight hour logs. How about that for a recent high school graduate! What followed were Army, Marine Corps,

and Naval battles across the Pacific. They included Guadalcanal, the Gilbert, Marshall, Caroline Island battles, the re-taking of the Aleutian Islands, New Guinea and the Philippines. Ed was released in 1945 as the War ended.

Before the War, Ed had spent a short time as an apprentice in the world of the newspaper press. When he returned, he went to work for the San Francisco Examiner, a very large and widely read newspaper. He worked in the press room! He served his apprenticeship and became a full-fledged pressman. And that he was for the next 40 years - at the Examiner and later at the Chronicle when the two papers merged.

But lets not get ahead of ourselves. In 1947, Ed met Pat! Yes, Pat became Ed's wife – they are now celebrating 65 years. That is a record!

In those days, automation wasn't an important element in the machinery that produced the paper. Ed describes (and has pictures of) the enormous press, those giant rolls of newsprint paper - each weighing 3/4 tons - the print cylin-


The devil is dumbfounded, 'I don't understand, when I turn up the heat you're happy. Now its freezing cold and you're still happy. What is wrong with you two?'

der, the folding machine. He can still describe how a 1500 pound roll of paper could be manipulated by two guys, he and another pressman, onto the giant press, how 40 lb print plates were mounted on the print cylinder preparing for a print cycle. He still tells that the folded newspaper had to be, in the end, stacked by hand. Of course as time went by, much of the above was automated or mechanized to minimize the human hands-on need.

Forty years later, Ed retires! He sits around for a while, but then is swept up into the world of Sons in Retirement - yes, there in San Fran in 1985. But three years later, circumstances brought Ed and Pat to Fresno. Almost immediately, he found a brand new SIR branch being formed here in Fresno. He joined! He was here, in Branch #159, at its 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting! And he's been here ever since.

What has Ed done in and for SIR? The list is long. How about being Attendance Chairman for

six years, almost from the beginning. He pioneered the Friday bowling league; he only retired from that position a couple of years ago. His hobby was photography! He put it to work in our Branch as the SIR Photographer. While he's still snapping, he's relegated himself to a lesser, assistant's position. But pictures still come out of Ed's camera.

Ed has had many honors over these 20-some years in Branch #159. In no particular order, Ed received the Honorary Life Member honor in 1997. When he completed 10 years as an HLM, he became a 'Senior HLM'. When Ed turned 90years old, he received the Senior SIR President's Award. For his devotion to SIR bowling, he was presented with a special Clock Trophy for his work with the bowling league. Further, Ed received an award from Branch #175 for his Seventeen Years as Bowling Secretary.

Ed exemplifies the 'best of SIRs' with this history of contribution to the 'well being' of this

organization. We often say to our members, 'Get involved! The organization is only as good as that to which is contributed by its members!' Here, above, is an example of what one of our members did over his 20-plus years. It all has made this organization a better place to be, to be a SIR in Branch #159!
