On September 13, 2018 I will be presenting to the BEC two motions that reflect the unanimous position of the Budget and Planning Committee which met in late July:

Pardini's has raised the cost of our buffet luncheons to \$16.00 from \$15.50 in 2019. This is the first increase in two years. Since we have been charging our members \$15.00 per lunch that means that the Branch has absorbed the \$.50 cents per plate cost each luncheon. Our average attendance runs about 135 members. This means we pay an additional \$67.50 each month, not to mention that we pay full price (Big SIR continued on page

uneaten lunches. revenue from the 50/50 drawings but we still face a shortfall over an annual basis. Recommendation: Motion 2018-13 will increase the cost of luncheons from \$15.00 to \$16.00 in 2019. This will eliminate the drain on the cost of the lunches by members. I will also propose 5 tickets for 4 dollars for the 50/50 drawing to help the movement of people through the line and to provide supplemental income for the Branch. I went back and checked that the luncheon costs moved from \$14.00 in 2011 to \$15.00 in 2012. I do not feel that a \$1.00 increase in luncheon cost will break anyone's bank.

The increase in the cost of lunch to \$16.00 is not nearly enough to cover the increase in expenses we face in 2019. In 2018 we are projected to have a net operating cost loss of \$1,150.00 dollars. If we continue with no change our balance could drop below the \$4,000.00 recommended by the State. The approximately \$670.00 in the loss from member's lunches is a part of it but we do have other costs to consider:

Each month we give away anywhere from 2 to 6 free lunches from our guest speakers, birthday boy, and our reward system which gives a free lunch to each member who brings in a new member. This works out at about an addition cost of \$912.00 from the Treasury in 2019.

Our Lady's Day Luncheons do incur some expense beyond the cost of the luncheon. This amount will vary depending on the event.


