PROGRAM

Speaker: Thomas (Tom) Marshburn, Astronaut

Topic: My Personal Experiences in Space



Dr. Thomas H. Marshburn was selected by NASA in 2004. The North Carolina native is a veteran of two spaceflights, STS-127 and Expedition 34/35. Prior to becoming an astronaut, Dr. Marshburn served as a Flight Surgeon, assigned to Space Shuttle Medical Operations and to the joint U.S./Russian Space Program and eventually became the Medical Operations Lead for the International Space Station.

He is currently in training as Pilot for the NASA SpaceX Crew-3 mission to the ISS scheduled to launch October 2021.

STS-127 was the 23rd flight of the shuttle *Endeavour* with a primary purpose of delivering research components. When it docked with the ISS on this mission in July 2009, it set a record for the most humans in space at the same time in the same vehicle, the first time thirteen people had been on ISS at any one time.

A Soyuz TMA-07M spacecraft carrying Tom Marshburn and two others blasted off from the Baikonur Cosmodrome on December 19, 2012 as part of **Expedition 34** which entered into the 13th year of continuous human habitation on the ISS. Some of the research goals for Expedition 34 included investigations into the human cardiovascular system in microgravity, the gravity-sensing systems of fish, and the impact of changes in the sun's electromagnetic radiation on Earth's climate.

Exit on Bunker Hill Drive - Exit 34, turn left across the overpass, then take the first right onto Skyline Blvd. Continue on Skyline Blvd about a mile to an open entrance fence showing "Sawyer Camp Trail, 950 Skyline Blvd" on the left side of the road. Find a convenient parking spot along Skyline Blvd. and unload bike. Enter through the gate to find trail information, benches, bathrooms and our waiting group. Sawyer Trail is flat prior to the dam. Jean (John) Mordo



I was born in Egypt but had a Greek passport, although none of my family or relatives spoke Greek and both my parents were born in Egypt. I traced our family name Mordo to Corfu, Greece, where there used to be a large Jewish community. Our family spoke French at home, and I attended a French school. In addition to French, I of course, speak English, am fluent in Spanish and can converse in Portuguese. I have been a French citizen since 1965 and a U.S.

citizen since 1985. I've lived in, worked, and travelled all over South America, Mexico, and across the U.S. You might say I'm an international fellow that has enjoyed a full life and am working on more adventures in my retired years.

I grew up in Cairo until age 11 when world events forced me to leave. Following the Suez Canal crisis of 1956, when France, the UK and Israel attacked Egypt to seize the canal, the situation for non-Egyptians and

especially Jews became untenable. My sister and I were sent to safety at a boarding school in Versailles, near Paris. We were a little scared to travel by ourselves, but our native tongue is French with a slight Levantine accent, and we were quite familiar with France since we took our family summer vacation there. We were fortunate to have good family friends who lived in Paris, so every weekend we took the train from Versailles, where our boarding school was, and

went to Paris to stay with our friends.

My dad, at the time, had a prosperous fire protection business in Egypt co-owned with his brother. Our parents came a year later after the business was confiscated and they were allowed to leave with only clothing and some

furniture. My dad, now an immigrant in France, was determined to provide for his family so he decided to restart his fire protection

business with some contacts he had. His hard work paid off and our family was able to assimilate well into the local community.

I attended Ecole Polytechnique, a school in Paris originally started by Napoleon to provide engineers for his army. After I graduated with an engineering degree, I worked one year while applying to business school. I often think I was lucky not to be admitted to Harvard Business School as I was accepted to Stanford. I was happy not to have gotten what I wanted (Harvard). See my favorite quote below. I loved being in California and competed for and won a French government sponsored scholarship to pay for my tuition. I ended up graduating eleventh in my class of about 300 and returned to France to work for McKinsey in Paris, consulting in the areas of strategy and finance. Luckily, two years later, the firm was short of consultants in New York, so I volunteered to transfer to that "tough" assignment. After four years in New York, I decided to move on to new opportunities and took a job with Otis Elevator, then a division of United Technologies, in West Palm Beach, Florida. I eventually became head of their Latin American Operations and travelled all over South American and Mexico. I moved to the corporate headquarters in Connecticut as the Chief Financial Officer for Otis and later transferred to become CFO for Pratt & Whitney, the jet engine division of United Technology Corporation.

One funny story when I first came into Pratt involved financial projections. I was taught at Business School that any investment return calculation above 5 years is specious, and certainly 10 years is the maximum. So, in my first week as CFO, staffers reporting to me showed me the IRR calculation for a new version of an engine. They showed me a 40-year spreadsheet! I laughed at them, but they told me: "Jean, if we do not go that long, we would not build any engines!". I found out that for a new engine, the cumulative cash flow turns positive after 20 years, and you need another 20 to have a decent return!

After Pratt, I left to become CFO of a public company rather than a division. We moved to Columbus, Ohio for a job at Scotts-Miracle Gro. I travelled quite a bit as CFO as we acquired several companies in Europe, and got the job of EVP for International, living in Lyon, France for several months following the acquisition. I love gardening and this was a great job.

I became a US citizen in 1985, the year I divorced my first wife. I remarried to Barbara, a kindergarten schoolteacher. I met Barbara through a man who worked for me at Otis Elevator in Hartford. Her marriage had just broken up and so had mine. We got married shortly after we met. She had one 6-years old daughter and I had a girl of 12 and a boy of 9. My kids lived with their mother in Washington D.C., but we vacationed with all the kids, usually on Cape Cod or Martha's Vineyard.

Since my days at Stanford, I always wanted to return to California. The chance finally came with an offer of CFO for Knight Ridder in San Jose. So, we came. While I realized my life goal to live in California, the business move was not the best.

The company was under terrible pressure from the competition with the internet for ads. It was fumbling, trying to buy several internet startups to learn the business. The company sold itself and the portfolio of newspapers ended up going to several buyers. That was in September 2001. Post 9/11, the economy turned down, so I decided to retire early.

I was just starting to get comfortable with the extra time on my hands when I ran into a bunch of people seeking to protect Los Altos Hills from overdevelopment. They had formed a group called Hills 2000 and were recruiting supporters. Barbara and I worked to campaign for Town Council candidates that shared our values to preserve the Town's way of life. We worked hard and were successful in getting people elected to Council and changing the direction for the Town. The newly elected councilmen now formed the majority to promote more protective policies against development, supporting walking pathways, and open spaces. I served on the Planning Commission and after a lot of cajoling to serve, decided to run for council and was elected in 2004. I served for two terms in Los Altos Hills.

We downsized in 2013 and moved to Los Altos. A group of friends convinced me to run for Council in my new town! I ran in 2014 and won. During my tenure we faced some significant challenges one of which I'll mention regarding business development. At that time, our downtown shops and restaurants were languishing. The Council was divided between those favoring modest development in the Downtown triangle and those wanting to preserve the status quo-or stagnation as I would call it. The latter Council members were supported by a minority but very vocal group that fought tooth and nail to block everything. After much discussion an agreement was reached and passed to finance a \$35 million new Community Center using the City cash, without a bond issue. Local politics became polarizing and nastier over time, and I ended up losing my third reelection bid and really retired in 2018. It was a blessing in disguise, as with the pandemic and the nasty politics, I would not have enjoyed serving the last two years.

Since the pandemic, I have tripled the amount of reading I do. I read more non-fiction or historically based fiction and most recently read and loved "Homeland Elegies", "People of the Book", and "Agent Sonya". One of my all-time favorites is "The Book of Lost

Names", set during the German occupation of France in World War II. I also enjoy cooking. I would say my cooking is eclectic. Some of my favorite dishes are French classics such as Boeuf Bourguignon and Gratin Dauphinois. I love Moroccan cuisine, especially tagines with preserved lemons and I do a mean Pastitsio, a Greek version of lasagna.

I enjoy gardening, now with a smaller plot than before. We have several lemon and lime trees and lots of flowers. Barbara and I are looking forward to traveling again. We plan on going back to Maui in October and to Europe in March. We love renting a house in the South of France, when we visit and plan to do that in the summer of 2022, followed with a road trip through France and Italy.

Several of my friends are SIR members and all suggested I join. I have been enjoying the Book group and look forward to joining the Hiking activity to complement our twice a week hike. I am currently serving as the Branch Executive Committee Recruiting Director.

I will close with my favorite saying: "Remember that sometimes not getting what you want is a wonderful stroke of luck." The Dalai Lama.



EL Corte Madera Creek Hike

Our June Branch 35 hike was so well attended that we had to split into two groups. We had three guests, four women, and 19 hikers split into Group 1 of 12, and Group 2 of 7 hikers.

We discovered the day before our hike that Sam McDonald parking area was closed for resurfacing. Our hiking group demonstrated amazing flexibility by relocating our hike to El Corte Madera Creek

Preserve in less than 24 hours. This hike was an advanced hike (greater than 5 miles and 900 feet ascent/descent). Our hikers were rewarded with the extra effort with a shady hike in the redwoods down to El Corte Madera Creek, back up to a Vista point, and the Tafoni Sandstone Formation.

The Sam McDonald Park hike is rescheduled to July 23rd. This is a moderate hike through the redwoods up Alpine Creek to the Heritage Grove, up to the Sierra Club Hikers' Hut for lunch, and back down through the grasslands with amazing views.

In the Heights. The American cinematic musical is alive and well. In the capable hands of Director Jon M. Chu, Lin-Manuel Miranda's Broadway musical shines with brilliant singing and dancing. The screenplay by Quiara Alegría Hudes resonates with modern themes. Shot on location in the Latino neighborhood of Washington Heights, on the northern edge of Manhattan, the characters come alive with their vocals. The dance numbers are spectacular and seem natural rather than theatrical. Usnavi (Anthony Ramos), runs a corner bodega and takes care of his neighbors especially Abuela Claudia, an older Cuban lady. He longs for Vanessa (Melissa Barrera) a knock-out who works in the local beauty salon. Usnavi dreams of winning the lottery and returning to his native Dominican Republic for a simpler, better life. Nina (Leslie Grace) who is the neighborhood star returns home from her first year at Stanford. She and Usnavi, childhood friends, are both confronting the meaning of family and home. Their songs about yearning for a better life are touching. This caring neighborhood is something quite special. Director Chu shows a mastery of closeups and then shifts to marvelous sequences with 100s of dancers. This is one to see and see on a BIG SCREEN in a Theatre. Mare of Easttown. This is an epic crime drama starring Kate Winslet as Mare Sheehan, a police detective in a small Pennsylvania town. It is seven episodes now streaming on HBO Max. Winslet is magnificent as she deals with the loss of her son, pressure at work, a drug addled mother of her grandson, friends that are pulling away and a local crime spree with missing and dead teenage girls. Some of the episodes are exhausting with their intense drama. Easttown is a typical small town with deeply held secrets, incestuous relationships and with everybody in everyone else's business.
