Looking *Back* Submitted by Don Mattson, a former Big Sir, from a newsletter from his high school (Lincoln High) in SF.

As the year 2022 has arrived, let's not forget where we have been and how we have survived.

Born in the 1930s and early 40s, we exist as a very special age group. We are the smallest group of children born since the early 1900s. We are the last generation, climbing out of the depression, who can remember the winds of war and the impact of a world at war which rattled the structure of our daily lives for years.

We are the last to remember ration books for everything from gas to sugar to shoes to stoves. We saved tin foil and poured fat into tin cans. We saw cars up on blocks because tires weren't available. We can remember milk being delivered to our house early in the morning and placed in the "milk box" on the porch. We are last to see the gold stars in the front windows of our grieving neighbors whose sons died in the War. We saw the 'boys' home from the war, build their little houses.

We are the last generation who spent childhood without television; instead, we imagined what we heard on the radio. As we all like brag, with no TV, we spent our childhood "playing outside." There was not Little League. There was no city playground for the kids. The lack of television in our early years meant for most of us, that we had little real understanding of what the world was like.

On Saturday afternoons, the movies gave us newsreels sandwiched in between westerns and cartoons. Telephones were one to a house, often on shared party lines and hung on the wall in the kitchen (who cared about privacy?). Computers were called calculators that were hand cranked; typewriters were driven by pounding fingers, throwing the carriage, and changing the ribbon. The 'Internet' and 'Google' were words that did not exist. Newspapers and magazines were written for adults and the news was broadcast on our radio in the evening by Gabriel Heatter and later Paul Harvey.

As we grew up, the country was exploding with growth. The G.I. Bill gave returning veterans the means to get an education and spurred colleges to grow. VA loans fanned a housing boom. Pent up demand coupled with new installment payment plans opened many factories for work. New highways would bring jobs and mobility.

The veterans joined civic clubs and became active in politics. The radio network expanded from three stations to thousands. Our parents were suddenly free from the confines of the depression and the war, and they threw themselves into exploring opportunities they had never imagined. We weren't neglected, but we weren't today's all-consuming family focus. They were glad we played by ourselves until the streetlights came on. They were busy discovering the postwar world.

We entered a world of overflowing plenty and opportunity; a world where we were welcomed, enjoyed ourselves and felt secure in our future although depression poverty was deeply remembered. Polio was still a crippler.

We came of age in the 50s and 60s. The Korean War was a dark passage in the early 50s and by mid-decade school children were ducking under desks for Air-Raid training. Russia built the 'Iron Curtain' and China became 'Red China.' Eisenhower sent the first 'Army Advisers' to Vietnam. Castro took over in Cuba and Khrushchev came to power.

We are the last generation to experience an interlude when there were no threats to our homeland. The war was over and the cold war, terrorism, 'global warming', and perpetual economic insecurity had yet to haunt life with unease. Only our generation can remember both a time of great war and a time when our world was secure and full of bright promise and plenty. We lived through both. We grew up at the best possible time, a time when the world was getting better, not worse. We are 'The Last.' More than 99% of us are either retired or are deceased, and we feel privileged to have "lived in the best of time!"

And YES, IT WAS HAPPY DAYS. Just ask the Fonz.

Balbir Kalsi Has the Round of the Month

Balbir Kalsi celebrated St. Patrick's Day by shooting the Round of the Month at Spring Valley. Balbir shot 5.2 strokes "under" and won his flight by 3 strokes. Well done, Balbir!

Do You Suffer from Aquaphobia (Fear of Water)?

Par 3's over water can freak out the best of golfers, as those who watched the best pros in the world splash their tee shots on the 17th hole at the Player's Championship on March 12th can attest. Branch 35 *Nicklaus* players should be aware that if you hit two consecutive balls into a water hazard or penalty area that spans the fairway (a "forced carry"), you may drop a ball on the far side of the hazard. If you rinsed your first and second drives, you would be lying five after your drop. *Palmer* players cannot take relief in this way. Here is the complete text of the local rule.

Rule 204 "2 Balls In Penalty Area" – Two Balls into a Forced Carry Penalty Area

After a Nicklaus golfer has hit two balls into a Forced Carry Penalty Area, from the tee or the General Area, he may drop across the Penalty Area in the drop area, adding four penalty strokes and an additional stroke for the distance across the hazard (five strokes total). Thus, if two shots are hit into the Penalty Area from the teeing area, the player may move to the drop area lying five hitting 6. If there is no designated drop area, use the General Area close to the cart path just past the Penalty Area.

Four Ball Match Notes (3/18/2022) by Ben Gikis

We played our match from the red tees at Coyote Creek Valley. I (Ben Gikis) was partnered with Don Mattson against Walt Joyce and Marc Haberman. They were 1 up after nine holes, but Don and I rallied to win holes 11, 12 and 13 to go 2 up. Then Marc shot a birdie 4 (net 3) to win 14 and cut our lead in half. Walt and Marc continued making critical putts to halve the next 3 holes. Going into 18 our team was 1 up, but Marc saved his team again with a par 5 (net 4), sending the match into sudden death starting back on the first hole.

On the par-4 first hole I had two handicap strokes and Don and Marc each had one. My drive landed in the fairway trap, but I got out and reached the green in 3 – but was forty feet from the hole. My first putt was well off the mark, and I missed my ten-foot comebacker for a 6 (net 4). Don hit a great drive but topped his second into the hazard. He went in and got it out onto the green and two-putted for a 5 (net 4). Marc hit a long drive, dropped his 2nd shot on the green and got down in two for a 4 (net 3) to win the match.

It was a great day of golf, with lots of clutch shots and putts and suspense until the very end. Congratulations to Walt and Marc on their victory!
