



















BOCCE BALL

The Rules Corner

This feature will help us learn what rules apply in common and notso-common situations. **Bruce Karney** provides the questions and **Joe Cioni** provides the answers.

The situation: During a 4-ball match play tournament, the team of Players A & B was competing with the team of C & D. Players A and C each hit their drive into thick rough. For his second shot, Player A mistakenly hit player C's ball. Player C promptly informed A that he'd played the wrong ball. Player A then hit his own ball out into the fairway. It's a 2-stroke penalty for playing the wrong ball, but does the swing that Player A took at C's ball also count? That is, does Player A lie 4 or 5 after his second stroke at his own ball?

The ruling: The swing Player A made at the wrong ball doesn't count, so he would be lying 4 if this had happened in stroke play. But in match play, hitting a wrong ball results in a loss of hole penalty. Except in four-ball, only Player A (not his partner, Player B) gets the general penalty (Rule 23.8a(2)) as long as hitting the wrong ball didn't help his partner. So, it would be possible for the team of A and B to win the hole if B's net score were better than both C's and D's.

Mattson Shoots His Age at Baylands

Age is just a number, they say. A golf score is just a number too, but when a man's golf score and his age are the **same** number – 89 for example – it's something to celebrate. When the man is 90 and his score is 89, that's even better!

On July 21, 90-year-old **Don Mattson** shot an 89 from the white tees at Baylands on his way to winning the Nicklaus flight. Let the celebration begin!

Branch 35 SIRs who shoot their age or better on a course rated at 66 or higher receive the "SIR Feather" trophy from State SIR as well as a \$200 cash prize from the Branch. Only the first time a member shoots his age in a calendar year is recognized in this way. Baylands' Course Rating is 66.8, so Don will be receiving both forms of well-deserved recognition.

Moffett is Child's Play, Los Lagos Not So Much

On July 6, during the State SIR qualifying tournament, ten Branch 35 golfers had over/under scores better than -2.0! That's never

happened before as far as this columnist knows. The magic of an easy day at the links seemed to affect all 33 players. Only one player, on one hole, posted a score above net double bogey. And, by the way, Jay Jonekait and Joe Cioni shot their age!

The very next day, playing from the white tees at Los Lagos, not a single golfer had an over/under better than -2.0 and the 26 golfers combined to shoot 27 strokes above net double bogey. The Los Lagos course is 1205 yards shorter than Moffett. What a difference a day makes!

Jonekait Cards the Round of the Month

As mentioned in the previous article, Moffett on July 6 offered low scores to almost everyone. However, **Jay Jonekait** had by far the best round. He was 9.7 strokes under, the best round of the year so far, and shot his age to boot. Keep up the good work, Jay!

We Broke One Hundred

Branch 35 has once again reached the milestone of having more than 100 golfers! Our median handicap index is 25.6. One-third of our golfers have an index of 30 or more. **Alex Bush** and **Robert Manetta** are the only members with single-digit indices.

A Call to Spy. This intriguing wartime, espionage drama is based on real stories. It is the early days of WWII and Britain is desperate for intelligence. Churchill orders his new spy agency — the Special Operations Executive (SOE) — to recruit and train women as spies. Some of the oldtime spooks scoff at women as spies, but others see the opportunities for women to show their special skills. Their formidable mission was to fund and plan sabotage in France with the help of local resistance. The SOE's "spymistress," Vera Atkins recruits two unusual candidates: Virginia Hall, a determined American with a wooden leg, and Noor Khan a Sufi pacifist. The infamous Nazi, Klaus Barbie (the Butcher of Lyon), breaks their code with dire consequences. These women and many more helped destabilize the Nazi regime in France. Their legacy is little known, but this film will change that. This is a must see. Rated PG-13 for some strong violence, disturbing images, language, and smoking. There are some bone chilling torture sequences. Available on Netflix. It is a Peggy's Pick.

Operation Mincemeat. There is a theme this week, this is another British WWII espionage film based on actual events. It is also a must see. This film uniquely combines a high-tension espionage drama with a romance, and a fair amount of humor. It is 1943 and the allies are planning the invasion of Sicily as the next step to take Italy. British intelligence concocts a wild scenario to convince the Nazis that Greece was the intended invasion site. The deception had a dead solider washing up on a beach in Spain with secret letters and orders for the invasion of Greece. To make this all work required an immense of amount of detail work and follow-up to convince the Nazis that it was real. This was all under the supervision of Ewen Montagu (Colin Firth) whose marriage is on the rocks and his hopelessly in love with one of his co-workers. Others in the group are under surveillance for possible connections to the Russians and for trysts. With all of this "stuff" going in they do pull off a coup, the Germans were waiting for the invasion in Greece. The film also features lan Fleming as an aide writing stories based on the spies and their quirks. An interesting touch. Rated PG-13 for strong language, some sexual content, brief war violence, disturbing images, and smoking. Available on Netflix. It is a Peggy's Pick.

Mrs. Harris Goes to Paris. They used to make movies like this all of the time. Maybe this will start a trend. Ada Harris (Lesley Manville) is a widowed cleaning lady in London in the 1950s. She covets an Haute Couture Dior gown and sets out to get one. She works hard, economizes a bit and even gambles to raise the funds to go to Paris a buy a dress for £500. Mrs. Harris is buoyant, caring, and indefatigable in her quest. She runs into difficulties, beyond the language, but her charm and wit overcome all obstacles. She not only achieves her goals but saves the House of Dior from its own plight. This is an engaging film with a wonderful cast. Even its Hollywood ending is delightful. Look for Lesley Manville at Oscar time. Rated PG for suggestive material, language, and smoking. In Theatres. It is a Peggy's Pick..
