At our October meeting, we discussed a science fiction classic "The Martian Chronicles". It was written by Ray Bradbury in 1950 at a time when our sum knowledge of Mars was a fuzzy telescopic image. The book is a "fix-up" novel of a number of previously published short stories. They were linked with some additional chapters to provide a chronological description of the first human explorations of Mars. The book was awarded a 2007 Pulitzer Prize Special Citation.

### Covote Hills/Alameda Creek – Niles/Fremont

Ride: We will begin the ride at the Coyote Hills Park and continue on the Alameda Trail to the quaint town of Niles where we will have lunch at the Nile Cafe (121 1st Street, Fremont, CA). The biking trail is paved and generally flat (at the start there are some gentle rolling hills) and approximately 9 miles each way. There is an optional loop with a scenic view of the bay that adds about one mile (a total ride of 19-21 miles depending on where you park). We can decide during lunch whether we want to take the optional loop.

Directions: Take Highway 101 North, exit on CA State Route 84 East towards the Dumbarton Bridge past toll booths, take the first exit, Paseo Padre Parkway. Turn left and go one mile to Paterson Ranch Road; turn left. This is the entrance to Coyote Hills Park (there is a small sign). Go 1/2 mile to the park toll booth (\$5 per car or use your East Bay Regional Park District season pass). Continue another 1/2 mile over several speed bumps to the park office and museum; park there.

If you prefer, you can take I-880 North and exit on CA State Route 84 West. Exit on to Paseo Padre Parkway and turn right. Proceed to Paterson Ranch Road and turn left. (Continued on Page 3)

**Optional FREE Parking:** There is a parking lot on the corner of Paseo Padre Parkway and Paterson Ranch Road (on your immediate left once you turn on to Paterson Ranch Road). Many of the riders will park here and ride 2 miles into the park.

Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park Observation Deck Loop Hike

On October 28<sup>th</sup> twenty-two SIR Branch 35 hikers plan to hike through the old growth redwoods and climb up to the Observation Platform overlooking Santa Cruz. The Observation platform provides majestic views of the redwoods below and the ocean in the distance. The Observation Deck Loop is about 6 miles with 800 feet elevation gain. AllTrails recommends a clockwise loop. We plan to do a counterclockwise loop so we can do most of the hiking before lunch. We plan to do most of climbing on Pipeline Road and Power-Mill Fire Road. The last bit of climbing will be a gentler pitch on Pine Trail with sand.

After lunch on the large platform with two picnic tables, we plan to return down the Pine Trail with its compacted sand with frequent big steps down. The Eagle Creek Trail continues with frequent big steps on the dirt trail through the Redwoods.

There will be many stops to explore the giant trees and to take photos. After our hike, we plan to do our debrief at Hapa's Brewing Company in Los Gatos.

Our monthly hikes, on the 4<sup>th</sup> Friday of the month, are designed to encourage spouse and guest participation. There will be many opportunities to socialize and to get to make new friends. Pack a lunch and we will stop at a scenic spot to eat and enjoy nature.

Recalling the days when we played at the old Los Altos Community Center, there was always coffee and hot water/tea available, and various folks donated fruit from their gardens (oranges, apples, lemons, persimmons, etc.) plus homemade cookies, and other tasty treats. In a conversation lately with Mary Jo Price, Recreation Supervisor and the manager of the new Los Altos Community Center she shared that the Cafe (Room 201, just inside the Center's entrance and near to the Bocce Courts, ~14' x ~8' or about 112 square foot in size-not large) will have a new vendor in January 2023 that will be on a "test" basis. Of course we want this to be a continuing service to us and the Center users, so a back-up concept was proposed to Mary Jo in case the trial vendor does not meet the Community Center's needs. This would be, for example, a multifunctional dispensing table-top machine that would provide not only coffee and hot water, but cappuccinos, mochas, espressos and other specialty drinks, all at the touch of a button on a screen. She seemed interested. We will gather the necessary data for this and have the information for her before year-end so that there is a welldefined and practical back-up that will give us and other Center users an enjoyable set of hot drinks should the new vendor not work out. We will also want Center users to contribute free fruits and tasty treats for others, which hopefully the Center will encourage. 2023 should be an enhanced Bocce Ball playing season-new wellmaintained courts and treats!

### The Rules Corner

This feature helps us learn what rules apply in common and notso-common situations. Bruce Karney provides the questions and Joe Cioni provides the answers.

The situation: At a recent SIR tournament "Golfer A" marked a ball on the green that he thought was his, but which actually belonged to "Golfer B". B pointed out the error, and A put the ball back and removed his marker. Golfer B said, "no harm, no foul, don't worry about it," and Golfer A did not assess himself any penalty strokes for his mistake. Was this in accordance with the rules? Would it have mattered if B had not been so forgiving?

**The ruling:** There is no penalty in this scenario. For stroke play, Rule 13.1d(1) says: "There is no penalty if the player, opponent or another player in stroke play accidentally moves the player's ball or ball-marker on the putting green."

In match play, Rule 9.5b states: "If the opponent lifts or deliberately touches the player's ball at rest or causes it to move, the opponent gets one penalty stroke." But there is an exception that would apply in the situation you describe. Exception 2 to Rule 9.5b states [in match play]: "There is no penalty when the opponent marks the spot of the player's ball and lifts it on the putting green in the mistaken belief that it is the opponent's own ball." In all cases the ball must be replaced on the original spot or the estimated location if the exact spot is not known.

This movie is his story of traveling to Viet Nam and experiencing the war first-hand.
