PROGRAM Conrad Ray, Stanford Director of Men's Golf



Conrad Ray, a former Cardinal standout student-athlete and touring golf professional, has served as Stanford's Knowles Family Director of Men's Golf for the past 18 years. He was a multisport athlete growing up with his heart set on the gridiron, but when he entered Stanford his golfing talent won him a walk-on spot on the Cardinal golf team. He was the only freshman on the national championship team that also included Tiger Woods,

Notah Begay, and Casey Martin. He went on to be a three-year letterwinner for The Cardinal, which he captained in 1997.

After graduating from Stanford with a bachelor's in public policy, Ray competed professionally on the Nationwide Tour for 6 years with 12 top-10 finishes, before returning to Stanford as a coach.

In his 17-year tenure as head coach, Ray led The Cardinal to 14 appearances in the NCAA Championships including the school's eighth and ninth wins in 2007 and 2019. Stanford student-athletes have done well under Ray's watch, with 28 All-Americans, 4 Pac-12 Players of the Year, 3 Pac-12 Scholar-Athletes of the Year, 3 Pac-12 Freshman of the Year and 23 All-Pac-12 first team selections.

Ray has been a member of the Golf Coaches Association of America National Advisory Board since 2006, has served as president and a member of the board of directors of the Association. He was one of three coaches selected to lead the United States Team for the Palmer Cup in Scotland in 2008 and in 2011 was inducted into the NCGA Hall of Fame.

Jonekait Wins Round of the Year Honors

After reviewing all the "Rounds of the Month" for 2022, the best of the bunch belongs to Jay Jonekait. He shot 9.7 strokes "under" at Moffett on July 6. An amazing accomplishment!

Ron Nakamoto Shoots the Round of the Month

The Rules Corner: How Do Branch 35 Golf Tie Breakers Work?

Branch 35 uses the USGA "Matching scorecards tie breaker method." If two or more players have the same net score, then we apply as many of the four calculations below as necessary to achieve a non-tied result.

- Gross score for last 9 holes minus one-half handicap
- Gross score for last 6 holes minus one-third handicap
- Gross score for last 3 holes minus one-sixth handicap
- Gross score for 18th hole minus one-eighteenth handicap

The handicap used is the "tournament handicap," also known as the "playing handicap," which is always a whole number. The fractional handicaps are **rounded before being subtracted**. So, if a golfer's playing handicap is 23, half of that is 12 (not 11.5), one-third is 7, one-sixth is 4 and one-eighteenth is 1.

It is possible that a tie cannot be broken, but it is very rare for that to occur. Imagine a case in which two golfers with the same tournament handicaps tie on the front nine and shoot identical scores for every hole on the back nine. Such a tie is unbreakable. When golfers are still tied after all four tiebreakers have been applied, then they split the prize money equally.

Example:

Assume Dan has a 10 handicap and Joe has a 14 handicap.

Last 9 holes

Dan **39** - (10/2) = 39 - 5 = **34** Joe **41** - (14/2) = 41 - 7 = **34** so still tied...

Last 6 holes

Dan **27** - (10/3) = 27 - 3.3 = 27 - 3 = **24**

Joe **29** - (14/3) = 29 - 4.7 = 29 - 5 = **24** so still tied...

Last 3 holes

Dan **15** - (10/6) = 15 - 1.7 = 15 - 2 = **13**

Joe 14 - (14/6) = 14 - 2.3 = 14 - 2 = 12 so Joe WINS!

The White Lotus.

The White Lotus is a luxury hotel chain that caters to the very rich and those who want to be. Season One was set in Hawai'i. This new season of six episodes is set in Taormina, Sicily. The story revolves around a very needy, buxom, and wealthy heiress, Tanya (Jennifer Coolidge). The hotel is run by Valentina, a very conflicted lesbian. Three generations of the di Grasso family from Los Angeles are spending a week trying to connect with their Italian roots. Two call girls are on the prowl. Two young couples are vacationing together with hidden agendas. A group of gay guys are on an adventure and get a lot more than they bargained for. The first five episodes of Season Two build tension and intrigue but barely kept my attention. All of this prologue pays off in a spectacular final episode that is far different than anything you could imagine. All Hail Jennifer Coolidge as the Queen of dark comedy. Black Panther: Wakanda Forever.

The movie opens with the death of King T'Challa, the Black Panther, as a tribute to him and to Chadwick Bozeman who played him in the first 2018 film. The film then goes on for two hours and forty minutes of endless fighting, posturing and eventual reconciliation. Queen Ramonda and her acolytes have to protect Wakanda and its vibranium from a secret world of human/fish characters that live at the bottom of the sea. Somehow the CIA gets involved. I found the film silly, boring, and way too long. The characters were uninteresting. I don't think my age group is the intended audience. The kids in the theatre seemed to love it. Rated PG-13 for sequences of strong violence, action, and some language. In Theatres.

MOVIE AND MUSIC HISTORY

There are few constants in life. Turbulence, ever changing, "as time goes by" are phrases we typically cast to describe a period we lived through. When you encounter the Rock of Gibraltar on your maiden trip to the Mediterranean Sea you remember the moment. On subsequent trips, your memories flood back to that time. It has become one of those constants in time for you, forever more. Movies and Music elicit those same moments for all of us, constants of where we were and what we were doing when we first saw or heard it. This monthly article recalls the bits of movie and music history keyed to the month of its release.

Movie: It's a Wonderful Life

"It's a Wonderful Life" is based on "The Greatest Gift," a 1939 short story written by Phillip Van Doren Stern. Frank Capra's 1946 film is hard to avoid during the holidays. After spending several years trying to sell his story to publishers with no success, Stern self-published his work and sent it to 200 friends as a 21-page Christmas card in 1943. RKO Pictures wound up getting a hold of "The Greatest Gift" and bought the rights to the story with Cary Grant pegged as the star. As they tend to do in Hollywood, things fell through, and the project languished before acclaimed director Frank Capra came on board in 1945 and named Jimmy Stewart as his leading man in the role of suicidal do-gooder George Bailey. Donna Reed, an actress who went on to become the ultimate upper-middle-class TV housewife, ultimately secured the role as Mary Hatch Bailey. Released on January 7, 1946, the film received mixed reviews but did garner five Academy Award nominations, winning none.

Filmed in the backlot in the San Fernando Valley during the middle of summer, you've probably noticed the over 6,000 gallons of cornflakes painted white to simulate snowflakes. The only drawback to this Hollywood creativity was the loud crunching noise made as the actors stepped on the snowflakes. In the years that followed, it received some serious loving and in 1990 was deemed "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant" by the Library of Congress. And another interesting casting note: That's a grown-up Carl "Alfalfa" Switzer in the small role of Freddie, Mary's obnoxious date in the film's famous dance floor-turned-swimming pool scene (and yes, that pool exists at Beverly Hills High School). "It's a Wonderful Life" was one of Switzer's few post-"Our Gang" adult roles as he shifted his

attention to hunting-dog breeding. He was killed in 1959 at the age of 31 after being shot in the groin in a drunken dispute over \$50.

Music: I'll Never Smile Again

January is the month that wipes the music slate clean and opens our ears to the first new sounds of the year. "I'll Never Smile Again" is a song written by Ruth Lowe, recorded by Tommy Dorsey and his orchestra, with vocals by Frank Sinatra and The Pied Pipers. This version of the song was first on Billboard's "National List of Best-Selling Retail Records" and stayed there for the next twelve weeks. Here is the backstory to the creation of this song.

Flash back to the 1930s. The Great Depression lingers. Unemployment is high. Europe edges closer to another World War. In Toronto, Ruth Lowe had just lost her father and so she supported the family by selling and performing songs she had written. This was the start of the golden age of the Big Band era and Lowe climbed aboard. After hearing her sing one night, bandleader Ina Ray Hutton invited her to join her all-female orchestra. Lowe did and hit the road.

After a gig one evening in Chicago, the singer/songwriter had a blind date with song man Harold Cohen. The two fell in love and soon married. After only one year, tragedy struck Lowe for the second time when Cohen died unexpectedly.

"Losing the two men she loved in her life, in such a short time, created such heart break in her and was the background that inspired the song", says Lowe's son. She said to my aunt, "I'll never smile again without him," and the next day she sat down and wrote the words to this haunting song.

Dorsey was introduced to the song through one of his bandmembers who was dating Lowe's friend. He liked it, rearranged it, and brought it to Frank Sinatra and the Pied Pipers to record it. This song ended up launching Sinatra's career. With the war now raging in Europe in 1941, there was a lot of heartbreak going on, and more to come.
