Jitze was born in Kenya and was conscripted into the British armed forces at 18 years old as a result of unrest in the neighboring Belgian Congo.

After serving with the The Kings African Rifles, he ended up as a Policeman, serving in various temporary posts within the colonial administration until Kenya too achieved independence. This included volunteering for missions

as a pilot with the Air Wing of the Kenya Police Reserve, and the AMREF Flying Doctors service in Kenya.

He subsequently trained in Britain for two years as an apprentice in a new profession – at that time referred to as "Computing Machinery" and conducted by the Government's "Post Office Training School" in a small village called Bletchley located just North of London.

He worked for a British Computer manufacturer, designing and installing mainframes in various countries. in Africa and Europe. While working at one point in Holland, he was approached by an attaché at the American Embassy. This meeting resulted in his recruitment by Seymour Cray, the chief architect at that time for Control Data Corporation – the American company specialized in building the biggest and fastest computers in the world.

Jitze joined their Palo Alto-based Research Division in 1968. After working for this company for over three decades, he retired and has

since been active in the Town of Los Altos Hills including stints as a Fire Commissioner and currently as a Planning Commissioner.

In his talk he will show his aerial photographs of the Bay Area, taken with our own Gary Waldeck as pilot.

The Rules Corner

Bruce Karney tees up the questions and Joe Cioni answers them.

The Situation: On the par-4 18th hole of the Arnold Palmer Invitational on March 5, Kurt Kitayama was on the green in two and needed a par to win. He stroked a long birdie putt that came to rest overhanging the hole, a scant millimeter or two from going in. As he walked toward the ball, the TV announcer excitedly said: "Tap it in, don't get the 10-second penalty right now." What the heck is the 10-second penalty?

The Ruling: After putting, the player has a reasonable amount of time to walk to the hole, and then has 10 seconds to see if his ball drops. A smart player will start counting out loud when he arrives at the hole. If the ball falls within 10 seconds, it is considered holed from the previous stroke. If it falls after 10 seconds it is also holed, but with a 1-stroke penalty.

Joe says: I always have a stopwatch around my neck when officiating to time three-minute ball searches and for overhanging putts like this. On the PGA Tour there is an official following every group. I am pretty sure they do the same. The announcer was wrong. No matter whether Kurt tapped it in or it fell in after more than ten seconds, the result would be the same: a par and victory.

The Quiz: Last month's Trail Tips asked readers to send in their answer to this Quiz Question: "A ball lies on the green in 2. The player marks and lifts it, then unintentionally places it at another player's nearby ball-marker and sinks the putt. Another player informs him that he played from the wrong ball marker. The player places his ball at the correct marker and holes the putt. What is the player's score for the hole?"

Quiz Answer: He scored 5. After holing the first putt he had completed the hole, unless the other ball marker's location gave him a significant advantage. His second putt was immaterial; he'd already finished the hole. But he must assess himself the general penalty (2 strokes) for playing from the wrong location, giving him a score of 5.

Who got it right: Nobody! Only one person ventured a guess, but he gave the wrong answer – 6 -- so I won't reveal his identity.

The Situation: A golfer who has no physical handicap often parks his cart on the collar of the green to save a few steps. Is there a

penalty associated with this? More generally, do the rules impose penalties for boorish behavior, such as intentionally coughing during an opponent's backswing, failing to rake traps, etc.?

The Ruling: Rule 1.2 Standards of Player Conduct applies.

1.2a Conduct Expected of All Players

All players are expected to play in the spirit of the game by:

- Acting with integrity for example, by following the Rules, applying all penalties, and being honest in all aspects of play.
- Showing consideration to others for example, by playing at a
 prompt pace, looking out for the safety of others, and not
 distracting the play of another player. If a player plays a ball in
 a direction where there might be a danger of hitting someone,
 they should immediately shout a warning, such as the traditional
 warning of "fore."
- Taking good care of the course for example, by replacing divots, smoothing bunkers, repairing ball-marks, and not causing unnecessary damage to the course.

There is no penalty under the Rules for failing to act in this way, except that the Committee may disqualify a player for acting contrary to the spirit of the game if it finds that the player has committed serious misconduct. "Serious misconduct" is behavior that is so far removed from what is expected in golf that the most severe sanction of removing a player from the competition is justified. Report serious misconduct to the Tournament Chair, who will then report it to the Branch 35 Golf Committee.

Why are Some Names Printed in Red?

Achievements in red are outstanding efforts that should be applauded by all Branch 35 members. There are four ways to join the red brigade: (1) if your "over/under" is -2.0 or better; (2) if your tee shot on a Par 3 is within a putter length of the hole; (3) if you eagle a hole; or (4) if you shoot your age or better on a course rated 66 or higher. The cash prizes are \$15 for IPL, \$25 for eagle, and \$200 for the very first time you shoot your age or better in a SIR tournament and \$25 for each subsequent occurrence, but no more than one cash prize per calendar year.

State SIR also provides a "SIR Feather" trophy to golfers who shoot their age or better. It is a two-inch wooden feather with a metal backing with the name, age, golf course and date etched on back and the score of the round etched on the front. The trophy is awarded only once per golfer per year, no matter how many times he shoots his age or better.

John Wick: Chapter 4. Keanu Reeves is back in the fourth (last?) episode of the carnage known as John Wick. He is also a terrible shot himself but does have an endless supply of ammo. John Wick is trying to free

himself from the curse of The High Table. As their hired assassin, he made many enemies and some friends. He now must vanquish his enemies who are everywhere and keep on coming. If you like non-stop action, this is the film for you. Note this is a mindless bloodbath that should also be sunned. Rated R for pervasive strong violence and some language. In Theatres.



Pinball: The Man Who Saved the Game. If you spent countless hours pumping quarters into Pinball games, this is a wonderful trip down memory lane. The 1970s come alive. The film combines documentary elements using contemporary interviews with the actual participants and dramatic presentations of the events and people who saved the Pinball Machine for posterity. It is the story of Roger

Sharpe, a young man from Chicago who was instrumental in New York City repealing its 35-year-old ban on pinball machines. Roger was a writer who became obsessed with playing pinball while in college. He used his skill to demonstrate to NY authorities that pinball was not a gambling device but a game of skill. Along the way he shares with us the history of pinball and how it came to be. The film tells an interesting tale with a fresh approach to its presentation. Not rated. Available on Amazon Prime Video. It is a Peggy's Pick.



Rye Lane. This is a refreshing new approach to a Rom/Com. David Johnson is Dom and Vivian Oparah is Yas. Make note of these two young actors. They both command the screen. Dom and Yas are both suffering from bad breakups. Dom is shy and reticent. Yas is ebullient. They meet in the bathroom of a South-London club. As they crash around the art and club scene of London, they tell one

another stories and get into all sorts of predicaments as they begin to form a relationship. The two characters are engaging. We root for them to connect. Many good laughs and poignant moments. 61* (Added by Bruce Karney) In honor of Opening Day, I'd like to share a movie recommendation: Billy Crystal's film 61* about the 1961 home run hitting battle between teammates Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris. The asterisk in the title reflects the decision by the Commissioner of Baseball that if either Yankee surpassed Babe Ruth's record of 60 homers, but took more than 154 games to do

so, their season record would forever wear the asterisk of shame.

(The length of a season had recently been extended to 162 games.) The movie itself is wonderful, especially for those old enough that their nostalgia sensors to be tingling throughout. But I urge you to watch the hour-long "Making of 61*" feature on the DVD before you watch the film. Crystal's love of the Yankees, Mantle and Maris in particular, is poignant and relatable. And for those baseball fans under 40, you'll be amazed at how modestly these titans of the game lived -- because their meager salaries didn't allow them to live any other way!


MOVIE AND MUSIC HISTORY

There are few constants in life. Turbulence, ever changing, "as time goes by" are phrases we typically cast to describe a period we lived through. When you encounter the Rock of Gibraltar on your maiden trip to the Mediterranean Sea you remember the moment. On subsequent trips, your memories flood back to that time. It has become one of those constants in time for you, forever more. Movies and Music elicit those same moments for all of us, constants of where we were and what we were doing when we first saw or heard it. This monthly article recalls the bits of movie and music history keyed to the month of its release.

While Asian American month is in May, that is also the month for Memorial Day, and I want to focus my selections on honoring our service men and women that month. So, I chose this month to recognize our fellow Asian Americans with these movie and music selections. If you have an Asian friend, bring him to our meeting. We could use more diversity in our membership!



Movie: Seven Samurai

If you are not Japanese, you may still recognize this movie title, by the number of western movies it has spawned with the same or similar movie plot. "The Magnificent Seven", with Yul Brynner, Charles Bronson, Steve McQueen, James Coburn, Eli Wallach, Robert Vaughn and a few others you probably remember. Or how about "The Dirty Dozen" with

Lee Marvin, "The Last Samurai" with Tom Cruise, or even "Star Wars" with Alec Guinness, Harrison Ford, and Mark Hamill. The central story line is the same, a motley band of ronin (samurai without a master- the good guys) are hired to defend a village from an army of bandits (the bad guys) wanting to steal their harvest and abduct the defenseless women and children of the village (the innocents).

Akira Kurosawa, who wrote and directed this classic, was known as the most "western" of Japanese filmmakers and in turn, was influenced by the cowboy films of director John Ford. "Stagecoach", "Rio Grande", and "Yellow Ribbon", all had the same strong main character, played by John Wayne as does Kurosawa with Toshiro Mifune as his main character actor.

Some interesting but little-known facts:

 George Lucas said, "Kurosawa had a tremendous influence on my life and work."

- The Kurosawa film, "Hidden Fortress" was a major influence on the story line for "Stars Wars".
- Lucas offered Toshiro Mifune, the lead actor in many of Kurosawa's films the role of Obi-Wan, and later for Darth Vader, but Mifune turned both down.
- Sergio Leone's "A Fistful of Dollars" originated from "Yojimbo" another Kurosawa film.
- "Rashomon" was reconfigured as the 1964 Paul Newman film "The Outrage".

The sharing and copying of movie storylines and cinematic technology and techniques between Hollywood and Uzumasa (the district of Kyoto that's known as the Hollywood of Japan) is one more contributing factor to a very close relationship between the two countries.

上衙いたこう Sukiyaki KYU SAKAMOTO

Music: Sukiyaki - Kyu Sakamoto

In 1963, "Sukiyaki" was the firstever Japanese song to hit No.1 on the U.S. singles chart and remained on top for the next three weeks. The song sold over 13 million copies, making it one of the best-selling singles of all time.

The song is a sorrowful song but

filled with hope. The story is about a young couple falling out of love. A few translated verses capture its story:

"'Walking along, looking up, so that the teardrops won't flow out of my eyes / I look back on a spring day on this lonely night. 'A good fortune is beyond the clouds / A good fortune is beyond the sky / So I'm looking up and I'm looking forward, imagining that good fortune in the future."

"It really is a song about the sadness of looking back, but also being on the cusp of something being better in the future. In some ways, that also helps explain the timelessness of that kind of sentiment." (Ian Condry, MIT)

The inspiration for the song's mournful lyrics wasn't love, but the political tension and protests the lyricist, Rokusuke Ei, experienced after a student demonstration protesting the continued U.S. Army

presence in Japan. He was feeling dejected about the failure of the protest movement as by the late 1950's the Japanese people wanted the U.S. occupation to end and control of their own country. Yet, in spite of the massive protests the Japanese government needed America's protection and signed a security treaty in January of 1960.

The protest movement in Japan failed to stop the signing and ratification of the treaty but after over 120,000 people rallied around the Diet (Parliament) with such anger and passion, the Prime Minister, Kishi Nobusuke resigned the next day. The American protest movement did the same as protests against the Vietnam War continued to grow and eventually influenced Lyndon Johnson to not run for reelection in 1968. The student radicalization movement of the 1960-1970s was in full bloom.
