PROGRAM

John Lehman: A History of USA's Music



John Lehman is a pioneer and serial entrepreneur in search software and technology. He began his musicology hobby-career in 1960 when he received a 1951 jukebox for his birthday which came with 100 records. Since 1960 he has turned that hobby into a collection of 600,000 records (78s, 45s, 33s), and four million digital songs, one of the world's largest private song collections. It includes every

song of every genre which reached any published popularity, covering 1890 to the present.

After researching how he remembers the songs and lyrics from his teen years, in December 2004, John played Christmas songs for a group of people in their 80s and 90s to see if they could remember who sang/played Christmas songs from the 1930s and 1940s. They knew every answer. That day began John's career as an entertainer/vintage music therapist, provided to over 150 organizations in the Bay Area.

John developed an approach to memory therapy using vintage songs for groups of memory-challenged persons. Three years of research on over 50 persons in residential care showed that some memory areas did not decline when twice weekly vintage music sessions were provided. Examples of his work appear in the film "Alive Inside", available in most libraries. The "WhoSanglt" idea has also become a commercial business which provides every popular ranked song by calendar date and genre to businesses. Peter Wong

The Ride: We will ride the nearly flat Bay Trail along San Francisco Bay for about 7.5 miles starting from the parking lot next to the Sangamo Theraputics, 7000 Marina Blvd, Brisbane, CA. 94005 (a historical and an architectural award-winning office building) just south of SF. Mattson Shoots His Age

Don Mattson shot his age (90) on April 13 at Rancho Solano. The course is rated 65.7 from the red tees, a mere 0.3 strokes below the threshold that would have qualified Don's round for a "SIR Feather" and a cash prize, but he did win his flight.

Don writes: It was my first time playing here and I was impressed with the course conditions. I recently changed to a blade putter, and I like fast greens, which Rancho Solano has. After hole #8 I felt I had a chance to shoot my age. I was focused all day on just making bogies. I did not make any long putts, but I was able to get my first putts close with flat or uphill lies. My best hole was #11, the hardest on the back nine, because of a lake in front of the green. I hit a drive more than 200 yards that ended up three feet short of the water, then hit an iron onto the green and two-putted for par. I only got nervous on the 18th, especially on my final putt – a three-footer that I fortunately drained. A fun day with good weather on a very nice course!

Cioni Shoots the Round of the Month

Joe Cioni had an outstanding day on the links on April 27. Playing in a first-round match at The Villages with partner Larry Low against Alex Bush and Richard McGrath, the 83-year-old Cioni shot a gross 78, net 66, to finish 6.1 strokes "under." Joe and Larry closed out their match on the 14th hole, winning 6 and 4.

How Walkable is that Course?

The Rules Corner

The Situation: Believing his tee shot might be lost, a golfer plays a provisional ball. He then finds a ball that he believes is his original ball, hits it, and then picks up the provisional ball and puts it in his pocket. Unfortunately, he subsequently discovers that the ball he just played was NOT his original ball. He resumes searching for the first ball he hit but can't find it within the three-minute search time. He replaces his provisional ball at the approximate location where he picked it up and takes 3 more strokes to complete the hole. What is the player's score?

The Ruling: The player's score is 9. Joe explains: one stroke for the original drive, a two-stroke penalty for playing the wrong ball, a stroke and distance penalty for the lost ball, a stroke for hitting the provisional tee shot, a one-stroke penalty for moving provisional ball, plus the 3 shots to complete the hole equals 9.

Even if you have put an identification mark on your ball, sometimes it may not be possible to immediately confirm that it is yours. In such circumstances, you are allowed to lift the ball to take a closer look under Rule 7.3. But before you rush to pick up the ball, there are some things you need to do to avoid incurring an unnecessary penalty when identifying your ball:

* You may only lift your ball to identify it when it is genuinely necessary to do so.

* Before lifting the ball, you must mark its position using a tee or something similar.

* If there is mud or dirt on the ball, you may only clean it to the extent required to identify it.

* Once identified, you must return the ball to its original position.

Failure to comply with any of these requirements results in a onestroke penalty and if you fail to replace the ball in the correct spot, the penalty escalates to two strokes in stroke play or loss of hole in match play for playing from a wrong place.

After Love. This is a little gem of a movie that straddles three cultures – English, French and Pakistani. We get to see the world through the eyes of Mary (Joanna Scanlan) an English woman who years prior converted to Islam to marry the

love of her life, Ahmed a Pakistani ship captain. They live in Dover England. Mary finds herself a childless widow when her husband dies unexpectedly. Soon after the burial, she discovers that Ahmed has a secret family just across the English Channel in Calais. Geneviève (Nathalie Richard) is a modern French Woman who is dedicated to Ahmed and their son. She knows Ahmed is married to another, but she is reconciled to her status. As these two women meet and the secrets are slowly revealed, we see how culturally different and similar they are. This is a well done and even better acted examination of societal expectations. Check this out on iTunes or Amazon Prime Video. Not rated but would likely be R for language and sexual content. It is a Peggy's Pick.





Somewhere in Queens. Ray Romano wrote, directed and stars in this look at what it means to be Italian in Queens, NY. Leo (Ray Romano) and Angela (Laurie Metcalf) Russo have been together since high school and live a simple, working-class life in Queens. The family business, Russo Construction. keeps everyone employed. The family is boisterous and at time destructive, but they all love one another. They celebrate their Italian American family. Leo and Angela's son

Matthew (Sticks) is a tall, quiet kid who is a better than average high school basketball player. Leo's life as Sticks' number one fan goes over the line as he tries to get Sticks a college basketball scholarship. His machinations threaten the core of the family. The film is mildly interesting as the story is predictable, but the performances are nuanced and worth seeing. Rated R for language and some sexual material. In Theatres.



Chevalier. This film commits the ultimate cinematic sin, it's boring. Lots of scenes of Paris in the late 18th century and folks walking around in gorgeous fashions and hats, but the substance wears thin after the first 15 minutes. The story is based on the suppressed true story of composer Joseph Bologne, Chevalier de Saint-Georges. Joseph is the illegitimate son of a slave and a French plantation owner who sends his mulatto son to Paris for schooling. Joseph is a violin

prodigy and champion swordsman. He rises to seemingly impossible heights in French society including catching the eye of Queen Marie Antoinette. All of this is happening as the French Revolution is a gathering storm. Joseph has an ill-advised love affair that leads to a falling out with the Queen who is soon to lose her head. MOVIE AND MUSIC HISTORY

There are few constants in life. Turbulence, ever changing, "as time goes by" are phrases we typically cast to describe a period we lived through. When you encounter the Rock of Gibraltar on your maiden trip to the Mediterranean Sea you remember the moment. On subsequent trips, your memories flood back to that time. It has become one of those constants in time for you, forever more. Movies and Music elicit those same moments for all of us, constants of where we were and what we were doing when we first saw or heard it. This monthly article recalls the bits of movie and music history keyed to the month of its release. Ron



Movie: Patton

"Patton" is a 1970 epic war film about U.S. General George S. Patton. The screenplay written by Francis Ford Coppola and Edmund H. North is based on the book, "Ordeal and Triumph" by Ladislas Farago and Bradley's memoir, "A Soldier's Story". The movie directed by Franklin Schaffner, won seven Academy Awards in 1971, including Best Picture, Best Director, Best Original Screenplay, Best Actor, Best Film Sound Mixing and Original Score

Editing, Production Design, Sound Mixing, and Original Score.

The movie took almost 20 years to put together (convince the family to support and allow access to Patton's papers, shop the property, write the screenplay, find the right actors, film on site in foreign locations, create the score (music), and finally edit to the final cut). Frank McCarthy, producer started with the Patton family who believed the media contributed to the general's wartime struggles and ultimate death, so refused to have anything to do with the film. The U.S. Army also refused but finally relented six years later.

Here are some interesting back stories about the making of the movie "Patton":

1. The movie portrays Bradley and Patton as friends, but the reality is Bradley disliked him, both personally and professionally. Bradley was known as the "G.I.'s General" as he was humble and softspoken, always caring for his troops, whereas, Patton, as portrayed in the movie was the exact opposite of Bradley.

2. George C. Scott was almost the last choice to portray Patton. Burt Lancaster, Robert Mitchem, Lee Marvin, Rod Steiger, and even Ronald Reagan turned down the title role. No one wanted John Wayne, the one actor that did want the role.

3. A significant part of the movie was filmed in Spain as the Spanish military was still using World War II equipment. Spanish troops were cast as members of the Third Army.

4. Robert Allen, a former Colonel on Patton's Third Army staff was paid to write the script, assisted later by Calder Willingham. Both were replaced later by a young writer, Francis Ford Coppola, who knew nothing about Patton. He was later fired from the production because among other things, his version opens with Patton's speech. As you now know, the final cut uses most of Coppola's 1966 script.

Music: We'll Meet Again

This haunting song was first recorded in September 1939 by Vera Lynn with Arthur Young. Written by Hughie Charles and Ross Parker it was one of Vera's first recordings at the time when Hitler invaded Poland and Britain with Canada, declared war on Nazi Germany. The song, its perfect

message, and its messenger, Vera Lynn was played over and over to the thousands of newly recruited soldiers now on ships bound for Europe, Africa, and later Asia to defend the many corners of the Empire. Separated from their loved ones, the song became the theme song of the nation for the long years ahead. It's haunting melody and words transported soldiers back to their peaceful lives at home and away from the trenches, muddy uniforms, and cold rations they subsisted on, always uncertain as to whether the next day or night might be their last. The British citizens also embraced the song as they battled for survival during the continuous bombings that was known as the German Blitzkrieg (lightning war) aerial campaign against Britain from September 1940 to May 1941.

The recording lived on after WW II as the featured song in the final scene of Stanley Kubrick's 1964 film, Dr. Strangelove as Slim Pickens rides the H bomb to its target.


