

Professor Hank Greely: Weird Stuff:



The Strangeness of Biology Meets the Templates of Law

Our culture and our law tends to like things simple, straightforward, and dichotomous: machine or organism, living or dead, human or not human, in a species or out of a species. But biology is usually much more complex and nuanced. Professor Greely will discuss

several examples where we ask "what is that?", wanting a clear answer that biology will not give, and ways in which our culture and our law might better deal with this complexity.

Henry T. (Hank) Greely is the Deane F. and Kate Edelman Johnson Professor of Law; Professor, by courtesy, of Genetics; and Director of the Center for Law and the Biosciences at Stanford University. He specializes in ethical, legal, and social issues arising from the biosciences, particularly genetics, neuroscience, stem cell research, and assisted reproduction. He is a founder and a past President of the International Neuroethics Society; chairs the California Advisory Committee on Human Stem Cell Research; and chairs the Ethical, Legal, and Social Issues Committee of the Earth BioGenome Project. For six years, until August 2022, he served on

the NIH BRAIN Initiative's Multi-Council Working Group while cochairing the Initiative's Neuroethics Work Group. He is the author of The End of Sex and the Future of Human Reproduction (Harvard Univ. Press 2016) and Crispr People: The Science and Ethics of Editing Humans (MIT Press 2021).

Greely graduated from Stanford in 1974 and Yale Law School in 1977. He served in the Departments of Defense and Energy in the Carter Administration and litigated at the Los Angeles firm of Tuttle & Taylor before joining the Stanford faculty in 1985.

Rittweger and Petersen Shoot the Rounds of the Month

There were several outstanding rounds in May, but two players tied for the Round of the Month by shooting 5.2 strokes under. On May 4 **John Rittweger** had his stellar round at Callippe Preserve. Then on May 25 **Herb Petersen** tied him for Round of the Month honors at Las Positas. Congratulations, gentlemen!

The Rules Corner

The Situation: While walking into a steep-sided bunker to play a shot, a player tripped and reflexively used his sand wedge like a cane, grounding it in the hazard to keep from falling. Should he assess himself a penalty? What if he had let go of his club as he fell and was not touching it when he and the club both landed in the sand?

The Ruling: Joe says: There is no penalty. Here is the relevant part of Rule 12.2(b)2 "When touching sand does not result in a penalty."

Except as covered by 12.2(b)1, this Rule does not prohibit the player from touching sand in the bunker in any other way, including:

- Placing clubs, equipment or other objects in the bunker (whether by throwing or setting them down),
- Leaning on a club to rest, stay balanced or prevent a fall,
- Striking the sand in frustration or anger.

But the player gets the general penalty if their actions in touching

the sand improve the conditions affecting the stroke.

I had a similar situation at a tournament at Poppy Hills a few weeks ago. The player was in the bunker behind the green, failed to get the ball out of the bunker, struck the sand in frustration, then hit the ball onto the green. He asked me if he was penalized for hitting the sand. I cited this rule and told him he was not penalized.

Rules Quiz: If you think you know the answer to the following question, email it to Bruce Karney along with an explanation of your choice by June 15. The right answer and the names of players who got it right will be published next month.

A player hooks his drive into the deep rough. Then he hooks a provisional ball into the same area. He's concerned that both balls could be lost, so he hits another provisional ball that finds the middle of the fairway. After one minute of searching, he finds provisional drive #1 in bounds and playable. He drops his hat to mark its location. He continues searching, hoping to find his original drive. How much time does he have to search for it from when he dropped his hat: 2 minutes, 3 minutes, or 5 minutes?

He took his personal battle to cure the disease to a global stage and his raised billions of dollars to fund research and treatment. 
MOVIE AND MUSIC HISTORY

There are few constants in life. Turbulence, ever changing, "as time goes by" are phrases we typically cast to describe a period we lived through. When you encounter the Rock of Gibraltar on your maiden trip to the Mediterranean Sea you remember the moment. On subsequent trips, your memories flood back to that time. It has become one of those constants in time for you, forever more. Movies

and Music elicit those same moments for all of us, constants of where we were and what we were doing when we first saw or heard it. This monthly article recalls the bits of movie and music history keyed to the month of its release.



Movie: The King and I


This classic movie, released in 1955, followed the well proven path from the 1944 novel, "Anna and the King of Siam", author Anna Leon Owens; to the 1951 Broadway musical by the team of Rodgers and Hammerstein; to the major motion picture that premiered in 1956. The Broadway musical was an immediate hit winning the Tony Award for Best Musical. The movie was a hit with 10 nominations for academy awards.

winning four. While Yul Brynner had made his mark in many motion pictures, this one story has been his most successful, garnering him a Tony award for "Best Featured Actor in a Musical" in 1952 and an Academy Award for "Best Actor" in 1957.

Here are some interesting stories about the original story and script, the making of the movie, and of course the actors.

- The story was based on Margaret Landon's novel "Anna and the King of Siam" (1944) which in turn was derived from the memories of Anna Leonowens, governess to the children of King Mongkut of Siam (early 1860s). The musical's plot relates the experiences of Anna, a British schoolteacher who is hired to educate his children as part of the King's drive to modernize his country.
- Yuliy Borisovich Briner (Yul Brynner) was born in Vladivostok, Russia to a wealthy Swiss-Russian family of landowners and silver mining developers in Siberia and the Far East regions of the world. The family enjoyed a good life until the Red Army occupied Vladivostok in 1922, confiscated and nationalized the Briner family wealth.
- The Thai government banned the movie because they said it was historically inaccurate and insulting to the Royal family. Historians believe many of Anna's own recollections were exaggerated or even fanciful.
- Rogers and Hammerstein discussed having an Act 1
 musical scene involving Anna and the King's wives. It took
 Hammerstein five exhausting weeks to finally come up with
 the lyrics for "Hello Young Lovers" which Rodgers never
 acknowledged as a fine piece of work.
- Other hit songs from the movie included "Getting to Know You", "Shall We Dance", and "I Have Dreamed".

Music: Heartbreak Hotel

If you talk about music, eventually you'll end up talking about Elvis. As one of my favorite singers, I of course, grew up with Elvis in Thailand, the country that went crazy for only two personalities, their sitting monarch, King Bhumibol and Elvis "The King".

In 1954 Elvis began his singing career with Sun Records in Memphis, TN. The story goes that he first went to pay \$3.98 to record 'My Happiness" and "That's When Your Heartaches Begin" for his

mother as a belated birthday present. Many biographers suggest that Elvis wanted to get noticed by Sam Phillips, owner of Sun Records. Phillips finally gave Elvis a chance in 1954 but was unimpressed with him. The two musicians assigned to play with Elvis were also unimpressed until during a break Elvis started singing his own version of "That's All Right (Mama)". Phillips liked the bright, upbeat, fast paced sound and started to record it. He said "Fine man. Hell, that's different – that's a pop song now, nearly bout."

Elvis recorded 24 songs at Sun Records before moving on to RCA Victor in 1956. In March he released his first album "Elvis Presley" with all top hit songs i.e., "Blue Suede Shoes" and "I Got a Woman". "Heartbreak Hotel" was recorded during this January session and released as a single. The song gained popularity after his appearance on Stage Show in March 1956. It became his first No. 1 pop record and his first million-seller.

Tommy Durden and Mae Axton wrote the song based on a newspaper story of a man who left a one-line suicide note. She happened to bump into Elvis and Bob Neal (Presley's manager before Col. Parker) and played her tape recording. Elvis loved the dark, brooding song and immediately made plans to record it. The

rest is history. One final note of trivia, Mae claims that she introduced Colonel Tom Parker to Elvis.


