Coyote Hills/Alameda Creek – Niles/Fremont

<u>Ride:</u> We will begin the ride at the Coyote Hills Park and continue on the Alameda Trail to the quaint town of Niles where we will have lunch at a downtown sandwich shop. The trail was temporarily closed because of flooding and downed trees from heavy rains earlier this year. The biking trail is paved and generally flat (except at the start there are some gentle rolling hills). The trail is approximately 9 miles each way, with an optional 1 mile loop of a scenic view of the Bay (total ride of 19-21 miles depending on where you park).

<u>Directions:</u> Take Highway 101 North, exit on Highway 84 across the Dumbarton Bridge past the toll booth, take the first exit, Paseo Padre Parkway. Turn left and go one mile to Paterson Ranch Road; turn left. This is the entrance to Coyote Hills Park (there is a small sign). Go 1/2 mile to the park toll booth/parking ticket machines (\$5 per car or use your East Bay Regional Park District season pass). Continue another 1/2 mile over several speed bumps to the park office and museum; park there.

If you prefer, take I-880 North and exit on Highway 84 West. Exit on to Paseo Padre Parkway and turn right. Proceed to Patterson Ranch Road and turn left.

Optional FREE Parking: There is a parking lot on the corner of Paseo Padre Parkway and Paterson Ranch Road (on your immediate left). Many of the riders will park here and ride 2 miles on a paved path into the park.

The best round of the month came on May 31 when John Ray carded an outstanding score: 6.6 strokes under at Poppy Ridge. His net 65 allowed him to win his flight by 3 strokes and puts him in the lead for "Round of the Year" honors.

How to Choose the Golf Ball that's Right for You

It's difficult to perceive the things that distinguish one brand of ball from another. Yet each brand offers six to twelve varieties of ball, and price points vary by a factor of 3 from cheapest to most expensive. Important objective differences between balls include: compression ("softness"), # of layers (from 2 to 5), and cover material (urethane or ionomer), and number of dimples.

How a golf ball performs depends on both its construction and how the ball is struck – what speed, what angle, what club path.

Each vendor's web site offers a ball selector you can use to get recommendations for the variety that best fits your game and desired performance outcomes. Here are three links. You can easily Google other brands.

According to a family member who is a Titleist sales rep, Titleist's ball selector focuses on greenside performance over distance because golfers can lower their scores most easily when their approach shots deliver predictable and consistent results. He also mentioned that modern golf balls don't "go bad" due to simply aging, nor do they perform differently if you play the same ball for 36 holes or more. You only need to stop using a ball if it is visibly scuffed, because that can affect distance, spin, and feel.

McGrath Qualifies Near the Top

At the NCGA Senior Net Qualifying Round at Baylands on May 25, Richard McGrath finished in a tie for second place out of 52 contestants. He easily qualified for the Finals, but, unfortunately, had to withdraw due to injury.

The Rules Corner

Rules Quiz from Last Month: A player hooks his drive into the deep rough. Then he hooks a provisional ball into the same area. He's concerned that both balls could be lost, so he hits another provisional ball that finds the middle of the fairway. After one minute of searching, he finds provisional drive #1 in bounds and playable. He drops his hat near it to mark its location. He continues searching, hoping to find his original drive. How much time does he have to search for it from when he dropped his hat?

Here are 3 possible answers, but only one is correct. Can you guess which one?

- 2 minutes (because in the case of multiple balls hit to the same area the "3 minute rule" is all the time allowed for searching that area, no matter how many balls he has hit there.)
- 3 minutes (because the search time is 3 minutes per ball, and it resets to 3 once he finds either of the two balls)
- 5 minutes (because he gets 3 minutes for each ball, for a total of 6, and has only used 1 minute so far)

The Ruling: When both the original and provisional balls are hit into the same area, then three minutes of search time is allowed for both balls. If they were hit to different areas, it would be three minutes each. Under no circumstance does a player have any leftover time to apply to a second search. In this situation the player has two minutes remaining to find the original ball.

BRANCH AWARDS PRESENTED AT OUR JUNE MEETING

Our June luncheon meeting took on extra significance as Big SIR Ron Nakamoto presented our Branch Awards to deserving members who volunteered their time and efforts to "better our branch". The Branch awards are comprised of two awards: (1) Distinguished Service Award (DSA), and (2) I'm Doing My Part Award (DMP).

An Award Committee, chaired by former Big SIR Andy Danver, convened in early May to evaluate candidate members deserving of recognition. Of our 300 members, the committee identified 76 candidates (25%) that volunteered in some capacity. Of that candidate list the committee discussed, ranked and weighted the most significant contributions and came to a recommended group of two DSA (1%) and nine DMP nominations (3%). The Awards Chair submitted the nominations to the Branch Executive Council who unanimously approved it.

The awardees were notified by formal letter and invited to attend the June awards presentation luncheon meeting. The awardees were seated at a special Awards table, provided a complimentary lunch and received their individual recitation, metal pin, and gift certificate at the luncheon.



Distinguished Service Award (DSA) Criteria

- Active member, more than three years
- Continuous exceptional service throughout his membership
- Stepped up to help his Branch succeed when asked
- Recognized as a major contributor to the Branch.





There are few constants in life. Turbulence, ever changing, "as time goes by" are phrases we typically cast to describe a period we

lived through. When you encounter the Rock of Gibraltar on your maiden trip to the Mediterranean Sea you remember the moment. On subsequent trips, your memories flood back to that time. It has become one of those constants in time for you, forever more. Movies and Music elicit those same moments for all of us. constants of where we were and what we were doing when we first saw or heard it. This monthly article recalls the bits of movie and music history keyed to the month of its release Ron



Movie: To Kill a Mockingbird

I'm sure everyone knows, and most have read "To Kill a Mockingbird", by Harper Lee, published in 1960. It won the Pulitzer Prize and has become a classic in American literature and required reading in high school.

Here are some behind the scenes facts about the author and novel.

• The plot and characters are loosely based on Lee's observations of her family, her neighbors and the event

that occurred near her hometown of Monroeville, Alabama in 1936, when she was ten.

- The novel was adapted to a screenplay by Horton Foote in 1962 and made into a movie by director Robert Mulligan, winning eight Academy Awards in 1963 including Best Actor for Gregory Peck (one of my favorites) and Best Picture.
- Lee modeled the character Dill on Truman Capote. Like Dill, Capote lived next door during the summer and shared an impressive imagination, and a gift for fascinating stories. Capote called the two of them "apart people". In 1960, Capote and Lee travelled to Kansas together to investigate the multiple murders that was the basis for Capote's nonfiction novel "In Cold Blood".
- The original title was "Go Set a Watchman" which was changed to "Atticus" but Lee renamed it to its title to reflect that the story was more than a character portrait.

Music: America the Beautiful – Ray Charles

The song was authored by Katharine Lee Bates, who was an English teacher and poet, born in 1859. After visiting Pike's Peak in Colorado, she was so awe-struck with that area of the country that she sat down and wrote a poem, describing the joys experienced by all

Americans.

The music was written in 1882 by composer Samuel Augustus Ward while on a ferryboat trip from Coney Island back to New York City. His tune, originally titled "Materna" was repurposed to the words

of the poem. The song resonated with Americans from all walks of life and spread in all group settings, from Sunday schools to civic readings, and in countless periodicals. While Bates was initially surprised by the poem's success, she later reflected that its enduring "hold as it has upon our people, is clearly due to the fact that Americans are at heart idealists, with a fundamental faith in human brotherhood."

Many famous renditions of the song have been sung across the decades.

Here is Ray Charles singing his soaring rendition of "America the Beautiful" at the second game of the World Series on October 28, 2001, just several weeks after the national tragedy of 9/11.
