PROGRAM Dr. Linda Riebel: Why Love Opera? An Invitation



Linda Riebel, Ph.D., is the author of the book *Irene Dalis: Diva, Impresaria, Legend* and of the article on opera in the *Encyclopedia of Creativity (3rd edition)*. She has been a member of the Friends of Opera San Jose since its founding in 2014 and served as its president for two years. A retired psychologist and adjunct professor, she played the harp professionally for 13 years and has given lectures on opera and Shakespeare.

This talk is Linda's way of introducing this splendid art form to newcomers, and to those who are not technically "newbies" but who want to deepen their understanding of opera. She will briefly define opera, share some music, explain why to love opera, describe the different kinds of opera music and end up with easy steps for getting started as an opera admirer. The event will include a rich array of musical selections from opera comedies and tragedies recorded by the greatest singers of our era..

On Monday, Oct. 16, Larry Low defeated Les Miles to reach the Match Play finals. Light Sentence for Killing Monarch Bay Worker

An Oakland man has been sentenced to three years and four months behind bars for killing a golf course employee in San Leandro in a 2022 hit-and-run collision, court records show. Jason McDermott, 44, pleaded no contest to vehicular man-slaughter in the death of Ismael Hernandez, an employee at Monarch Bay Golf Course. The crash occurred on April 18, 2022. Hernandez had been riding a lawnmower at work when he was struck by a stolen Dodge pickup truck driven by McDermott.

The Rules Corner

The Situation: A player's bag contains 14 clubs and a LagShot® training aid. The LagShot looks like a 7-iron but its flexible shaft is made of rubber and its purpose is to train the cocking of the wrists during the backswing. Should the player be penalized for having more than the maximum number of clubs, which is 14?

The Ruling: He can carry it in his bag, but he must declare it to be "not in play." If he takes it out and exercises with it, he is penalized. It's best not to carry it. In stroke-play events the penalty for carrying too many clubs is two strokes for each hole during which you've exceeded the limit, with a maximum penalty of four strokes under Rule 4-1.

Killers of the Flower Moon. Martin Scorsese brings us another great story that at a 3 hours and 26 minutes run-time is way too long. An hour could easily be chopped from the movie, and it would be better. The Osage Nation is assigned a section of land in Oklahoma that is seemingly worthless. When oil is discovered on their land in the 1920s, the Osage become some of the wealthiest folks in the country. When crooked white folks get wind of this opportunity, they devise schemes and murders to deprive the Osage of their riches. The lead crook is William Hale (Robert DeNiro) who corrupts his nephew, Ernest (Leonardo DiCaprio), to carry out his nefarious





plans. William has the local police in his employ; so, the FBI gets involved to settle the score. The film is based on actual events. wait for it to stream. In Theatres. Rated PG-13 for violence, some bloody images and strong language.





MOVIE AND MUSIC HISTORY

There are few constants in life. Turbulence, ever changing, "as time goes by" are phrases we typically cast to describe a period we lived through. When you encounter the Rock of Gibraltar on your maiden trip to the Mediterranean Sea you remember the moment. On subsequent trips, your memories flood back to that time. It has become one of those constants in time for you, forever more. Movies and Music elicit those same moments for all of us, constants of where we were and what we were doing when we first saw or heard it. This monthly article recalls the bits of movie and music history keyed to the month of its release. Ron



Movie: Ben-Hur

Released in 1959, the MGM film was originally announced to be funded in 1952 but it took until 1958 with twelve versions of the script, written by multiple writers to finally satisfy the new director William Wyler. He started with an enormous, \$7 million dollar budget which ended up costing the studio \$15 million when it was done. The epic film's run time was a whopping 212 "Overture", minutes with an "Intermission". "Entr'acte" and audience breaks. The initial release grossed 147 million and was nominated

for 12 academy awards and garnered 11.

The scale of the production was enormous. The production utilized 300 sets, scattered over 150 acres, with nine sound stages. One million pounds of plaster and 40,000 cubic feet of lumber was used. One hundred thousand costumes and 1,000 suits of armor were made for 10,000 extras, with hundreds of camels, donkeys, horses, and sheep. Ten countries were involved in the making of the film, whether it was set location, material procurement, or skilled labor for costume construction.

The chariot race required 15,000 extras on 18 acres set on the backlot of Cinecitta Studios outside of Rome. Eighteen chariots were built for use, and the total shoot took five weeks to film. Didn't you experience the drama and savageness of the moment? Without computer graphics and THX sound, just expert cinematography and raw acting immersed you into that moment. Awesome.

For you film aficionados, the chariot race has a 263-to-1 cutting ratio (263 feet of film for every one foot used), probably the highest for any 65mm sequence ever filmed. The nine-minute chariot race was cinema's most famous action sequences at that time.

Kirk Douglas was offered the role of Messala but turned it down because he didn't want to play a "second-rate baddie". He wanted to play Judah Ben-Hur but was too old and Charlton Heston was already cast in the lead role. Kirk being Kirk developed his own epic project and released it in 1960 to compete against Ben-Hur. His film was "Spartacus".

Music: Battle of New Orleans Johnny Horton

This song is based on a real battle that occurred in the New Orleans area in the War of 1812 with England. The battle was fought on January 8, 1815, between Major General Sir Edward Pakenham and the American forces lead by Major General Andrew

Jackson. Despite a large British advantage in numbers, training, and combat experience, the American forces soundly defeated the British when they mounted a poorly executed assault which resulted in over 2,000 British deaths including the commanding general. And his second in command.

Why did the British invade New Orleans while they were in negotiations to end the war? Here is the rest of the story. Both Britain and the United States had begun negotiations to end the war on August of 1814. The Treaty of Ghent was to become the output of those negotiations. However, British Secretary of State for War and the Colonies, Henry Barthurst issued secret orders to MG Pakenham to continue the war. British Vice Admiral Cochrane also convinced the Admiralty that they could easily take New Orleans which would weaken American resolve and curtail continued expansion west and

north to Canada. They could easily reclaim the Louisiana territories ceded by Napoleon whose act they did not recognize.

Well, the song says it all. Written by Jimmy Driftwood, an Arkansas high school history teacher and later principal. He is credited with writing songs to help students learn about historical events. The song became a hit, selling over one million copies and in 1959 won a Grammy for Song of the Year.




