





The author, through extensive use of primary sources, tells the story of the people and events leading up to, during, and after the disaster.

more details. Start with Wikipedia where you will find a great collection of pictures and maps.

Location: Bocce Ball Courts at the Los Altos Community Center, 97 Hillview Ave., Los Altos (off San Antonio Road), 650-947-2790. Ample parking in front. The Bocce Ball courts are in the left rear of the site as you face the front entrance of the Center.

- 1. Weather Realities vs. Play Schedule: Given the onset of rains, we adjust when play on the crushed oyster shell surface of the two courts is practical for our use. Norm Pass makes the final determination for how the weather impacts our Friday am play. Note that if it rains anytime on Wednesday, the court surfaces may not be ready for play on the following Friday morning, especially if the Thursday right after the Wednesday rain is not very sunny.
- 2. Coffee/Tea Reality at the Los Altos Community Center: On Monday through Thursday, from 9 am to 2 pm, coffee and tea are available at the Center in a room just inside the Hillview Ave. facing entrance. However, of course that does us no good given our Friday play schedule. The so called "Cafe" is now being used as a storage room for excess furniture. One year after the management of the Center started the process to secure a vendor that would offer beverages/sandwiches/snacks that process is stalled/stopped. Legal issues may have been a problem. Those of us who played Bocce in the Old Community Center remember always having hot beverages available on Friday mornings (at no cost) with the adjunct, sometimes, of participants offering fruits (citrus, etc.) from their yards free for the taking.

Glynn Shoots the Round of the Month

If you're a high handicapper who dreams of shooting the Round of the Month, Joe Glynn has lived your dream. Joe was carrying a course handicap of 45 at Boulder Ridge on October 30 when he shot gross 110, net 65, to card the best round of the month, finishing 6.6 strokes "under." Joe, we tip our hats to you for this stellar round, no matter how high or low our index is!

Rittweger Is the Match Play Champ

After each winning 3 or 4 matches to make it to the final, the concluding match of our season between Larry Low and John Rittweger was expected to be a closely fought battle. But that was not to be. It was John's day from the start, and the round concluded with a handshake on the 13th green and a 7 & 5 result.

Cioni & McGrath Place Third in Senior Team Tourney

The team of Cioni and McGrath was in sixth place going into the recent NCGA Senior Team Tournament final at Boulder Ridge, a tough layout: 5700 yards and 126 slope. (By the way, the NCGA says a "senior" is any man born before 1969 or woman born before 1974! Isn't it nice to know that the NCGA seems to think that playing golf causes women to age faster than men?)

Richard and Joe played very well (8 under par net score) and finished third in the event as well as third for the season, which netted them a \$100 prize. Joe shot 83 – one less than his age – and Richard shot 79.

The highlights of Joe's day included a CTP prize for landing 3 feet from the hole on #14 (and making the putt) and sinking an 85-foot birdie on #15. Richard carded birdies on #3 and #16.

Not bad for the oldest combined age pair in the tournament - 158 years between them!

McGrath Finishes Seventh in Super Seniors

Richard McGrath finished seventh out of more than 200 golfers aged 65 and above in the NCGA Super Seniors year-long series of tournaments. The final round was played at Danville's Blackhawk Lakeside course under exceptionally windy and difficult conditions.

The Rules Corner

This month's column features situations involving giving or receiving advice during a round. Most SIRs are friendly and love to give advice on all manner of topics. As a result, rules about advice are often violated in our matches. But rules are rules, and it is important to know what they allow – and what they don't.

You may give or solicit advice only if you're talking to your caddie (or partner or partner's caddie in a four-ball competition). Exception: you may ask or answer questions about general information such as distances and locations of course features. For example: "Is that flag red or blue?" "How far is it to the green?" "Is there a sand trap on the back side of that hill?" "Did you see where my ball went?"

You may not ask or answer questions like "How fast do you think the wind is blowing?" "What club did you just hit?" "Do you think I can reach the green with my 8-iron?"

Here are seven examples from Bruce Karney with answers provided by Joe Cioni.

Situation #1: Player A prepares to hit what he thinks is his ball, but it is Player B's. Before B hits, A says "Hey, that's my ball!" Player B then finds his ball and plays it. Any penalty?

Ruling #1: No harm, no foul.

Situation #2: Player X tees his ball 6 inches ahead of the tee markers. His opponent calls his attention to this so that X can re-tee the ball. Do any penalties apply?

Ruling #2: I assume this is match play since you use the word "opponent." In match play, if a player hits a ball that was teed up outside the teeing area, his opponent has the option of letting the shot stand or making the player re-tee in the correct area. No penalty in either case. If this were a stroke play competition, there is no penalty for calling attention to the fact that the ball is not in the teeing area. If X plays the ball outside of the teeing area, that is a two-stroke penalty and must be corrected.

Situation #3: On a par 3, the first player to tee off is surprised when his shot lands 15 yards short of the green. He exclaims, to nobody in particular, "I can't believe it! I crushed my 7 iron and still came up way short!" Is he penalized for offering advice?

Ruling #3: This is a tough one. If he said that to try to influence others

in his group, then yes, he was offering advice and should be penalized two strokes. This would be particularly true if there were weather conditions, such as wind in his face. The facts that he said it and that it was heard by others in the group who could be influenced by the statement, make it advice.

Situation #4: On another par 3, before the last member of the group tees off, he says: "I'm thinking of hitting a 6 iron. What did you guys hit?" Nobody answers. Was he seeking advice?

Ruling #4: He was definitely asking for advice, so it's a two stroke penalty for him. Because nobody answered, no penalty to the other players. If someone had responded, then both players would get two-stroke penalties.

Situation #5: After a player duffed a shot, another player in his foursome said. "You should have kept your head down."

Ruling #5: Borderline. But I would say not advice, just an explanation why the shot went bad.

Situation #6: After a player duffed his fourth shot of the front nine another player said, "If you want to stop doing that you should learn to keep your head down."

Ruling #6: This is an example of offering advice. Two stroke penalty.

Situation #7: After duffing yet another shot, the duffer asked a member of his foursome "Did I keep my head down that time?"

Ruling #7: No penalty. He wasn't asking for advice; he was asking to verify a situation.

MOVIE AND MUSIC HISTORY

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There are few constants in life. Turbulence, ever changing, "as time goes by" are phrases we typically cast to describe a period we lived through. When you encounter the Rock of Gibraltar on your maiden trip to the Mediterranean Sea you remember the moment. On subsequent trips, your memories flood back to that time. It has become one of those constants in time for you, forever more. Movies and Music elicit those same moments for all of us, constants of where we were and what we were doing when we first saw or heard it. This monthly article recalls the bits of movie and music history keyed to the month of its release.

This month, I am reversing our "Movie and Music History" order as this song was so popular that it spawned the movie



Music: White Christmas

Irving Berlin's holiday ballad was the most recorded and bestselling song of all time. Here are some facts you might not know about the song:

• The song "White Christmas" was composed by Irving Berlin in 1940 and first sung by Bing Crosby on

December 25, 1941, on the Kraft Music Hall Show, which Bing hosted. Pearl Harbor had been attacked just a few weeks before.

- Jody Rosin, author of "White Christmas: The Story of an American Song", believes, Irving Berlin wrote the song as a tribute to his young baby son, who died on Christmas day. "It was Berlin responding in some way to his melancholy about the death of his son." Rosen said.
- It was sung by Crosby in the film "Holiday Inn" and won an Oscar for Best Song in 1943.
- The song endured over the 1940's and climbed to #1 on the charts several times, particularly during World War II because of its nostalgic message. Crosby said the song was constantly requested by troops he was entertaining as part of the USO shows. "Heavens knows, I didn't come that far to make them sad. For this reason, several times I tried to cut it out of the show, but these guys just hollered for it."

Movie: White Christmas

If it's December, it's "White Christmas" movie time with the family. Here is a bit of this movie's, history.

- Irving was the one that suggested a movie be made based on his song, but it took until 1954 with a \$2 million budget from Paramount and some major script rewrites to get it into production.
- Fred Astaire was to be paired with Bing Crosby as he did in

"Holiday Inn" but bowed out after reading the original script which was awful.

- Donald O'Connor was to replace Fred, but he took ill and was replaced by Danny Kaye who agreed to take the role for a salary of \$200,000 and 10% of the gross. (His salary was 10% of the budget and his ownership interest was worth \$13M in today's dollars.)
- Berlin wrote seven new songs for the film including "Gee I Wish
 I Was Back in the Army" for the quartet of Crosby, Kaye,
 Clooney, and Vera-Ellen.
- All the main characters sang except for Vera-Ellen (Judy Haynes character) whose voice was dubbed by Trudy Stevens.
- The movie grossed \$12 million, equivalent to \$131 million today, making it the highest grossing musical film at the time.

Some background on Bing, I bet you didn't know:

- His music career spanned decades with 43 #1 songs, including 50 million copies sold of "White Christmas."
- His movie career included a string of box office hits, to include a Best Actor Oscar for "Going My Way", the highest grossing film in 1944.
- Bing owned several local television stations and was a producer of TV hit series "Hogan's Heroes" and "Ben Casey".
- He was part owner of sports teams including the "Pittsburgh Pirates".
- Do you remember his Minute Maid orange juice commercials?
 He was a principal investor of Minute Maid.
- Perhaps his most unusual investment and as it turns out his most lucrative was his investment in magnetic recording tape.
- Of course, he was the host of the Pebble Beach Clambake in 1937 which evolved into the AT&T Pro Am. He was a significant personality that brought the game of golf to the public and made it fun with celebrities playing next to professionals. He had a golf index of 2.


