## Program: Martha Wallace

## Rengstorff House at Shoreline "the oldest house in Mountain View"



Did you know that Mountain View was a busting port in the late 1800s? In 1850 Henry Rengstorff came from Germany looking for fortune in the California Gold Rush. Martha Wallace will share stories of Henry's family, his success in Santa Clara County, the development of shipping on the Bay, and the port of Mountain View, and take you through the Rengstorff House, now a museum.
Martha Wallace is a retired middle school teacher. She always wanted to be a docent in a castle in England, but the commute was too long, so she now volunteers at Rengstorff House, the oldest house in Mountain View. She also volunteers at the National Archives in San Bruno. She enjoys studying medieval and American history, connecting her ancestors to actual events, and exploring local history. In 2021, she led the Los Altos DAR to compile and edit The Early Settlers of Old Los Altos/Mountain View, a clickable PDF (free download at http://tinyurl.com/48nfm8td ).

The Book Club is an activity where most months of the year, all members read the same book and then meet to discuss it.


How the World Really Works - A Scientist's Guide to Our Past, Present and Future by Vaclav Smil provides numerical evidence proving we are slaves to fossil fuels, which are needed not only to power most of the world's land, sea and air vehicles and generate electricity but also to provide the energy required to produce the ammonia fertilizer for farming, steel, concrete and plastics that are essential to the quality of life and prosperity of the modern world. Smil explains that the processes used to create these materials require burning enormous amounts of fossil carbon. Smil, an emeritus professor of environmental science who has written nearly 40 books on the subject, explains the mechanisms by which burning fossil carbon causes the problems we categorize as "climate change." He confirms that it is essential for the world to use its fuels more efficiently and find ways to introduce less carbon in the atmosphere. But Smil notes that the usual solutions (more renewable energy, electrification of homes and vehicles, reducing animal protein in diets) won't be enough. It will also be necessary to solve the complex problems of producing food and industrial materials with less fossil carbon. Solutions will take many decades because as Smil notes there are no realistic alternatives and "the gap between wishful thinking and reality is vast.".
The Book Group found the book highly informative but challenging because Smil backs up his arguments with a staggering amount of data, some of which is quite fascinating. But within the numbers are clear explanations of complex processes and unexpected interrelationships that give the reader a reality check!

Our March book will be "The Lost City of the Monkey God" by Douglas Preston.

2024 Oscar Nominated Short Films: Documentary. Most of these marvelous short documentaries can be seen on YouTube. "The Last Repair Shop" is a heartwarming look at the Los Angeles School District musical instrument repair shop and the marvelous people who make it work. The kids who get to use these bravura instruments forever benefit. (Our favorite). "The Barber of Little Rock" tells the story of a young man who takes his barbering skills and entrepreneurship and turns it all into a huge benefit for his community. "Nai Nai and Wai Po" tells the story of two Chinese grand mothers who share grandchildren and their sunset years together. It is a touching story on Hulu. "The ABCs of Book Banning" takes aim at the book banners of the world are how short sighted they are. Bright young girls read the banned books and then discuss the books with insight and intellect. "Island In Between" takes a modern look at the status of independent Taiwan and China's desire to end Taiwan's independence.


Ordinary Angels. This is a good, old fashioned Hollywood tearjerker. It's even better in that it is a true story. It is the early 1990s and Ed (Alan Ritchson) just lost his wife to cancer. He now has two daughters to raise on his own. Michelle, the younger, needs a liver transplant. Ed, of course, has no insurance and the costs of everything are overwhelming. Into their lives enters Sharon (Hilary Swank) who is a local hairdresser battling her own demons but finds solace in helping others. She rallies the town and gets an amazing taskforce together to get Michelle to the hospital in time for a transplant. Rated PG for thematic content, brief bloody images, and smoking. In Theatres. It is a Peggy's pick.


Taste of Things. This delectable film is France's Oscar Nominee for the Best International Feature Film. It does not disappoint. It is a great love story told while masters of French Cuisine ply their trade in a kitchen supplied with fresh foods of amazing quality, wines, and spirits. Too bad smell-a-vision is not available. The cooking sequences are amazing. Set in 1885, Eugenie (Juliette Binoche), is an honored cook. She has worked for Dodin (Benoit Magimel), a renowned gourmet and restauranteur, for 20 years. They slowly grow fond
of each other. A romance develops that is demonstrated by the food creations they make. The film is a celebration of French Haute Cuisine and all things French. In French with English subtitles. Rated PG-13 for some sensuality, partial nudity, and smoking. In Theatres.


2024 Oscar Nominated Short Films: Live Action. "Invincible" looks at mental health. "Knight of Fortune" is a strange look at death through Danish eyes. ## Movie: The Godfather.

Released on March 15th, 1972, Francis Ford Copolla's masterpiece and first movie of an all-time great trilogy cost about $\$ 7 \mathrm{M}$ to make but grossed 20 times that at the US box office and 40 times that internationally.
Copolla was not initially enthusiastic to take on the project as he found Mario Puzo's novel 'pretty cheap' but smarting from the poor reception of his previous project 'The Rain People', he decided to do it. His first choice for the role of Don Vito Corleone was Marlon Brando but the Paramount Studios management were leary of Brando for being notoriously difficult to manage on the set, they offered British actor Lawrence Olivier instead. Copollo insisted on Brando so the studio made three conditions before they'd consider it. Firstly, he had to do a screen test. Secondly, if cast, he'd have to work for free. Thirdly, he would have to put up a personal bond to make up for potential losses caused by his infamous behavior on-set. Copollo convinced Brando to do the screen test by telling
him it was just a makeup test. When Paramount saw the resulting footage, they were so impressed they dropped the two other conditions and signed Brando for the role.


Brando famously would not learn his lines so cue cards were hidden around the set for him to read. Here is a 'gotcha' photo of a cue card actually taped to Robert Duvall's chest during shooting.
It is said that there was significant involvement by real mafia in the movie making. A group dedicated to remove stereotyping of Italian Americans, The Italian American Civil Rights League, led by Joe Colombo Sr., protested the film as soon as production was started and applied pressure to moderate it. Albert Ruddy, the film's producer, had his car vandalised and Paramount chief executive Robert Evans reportedly received threatening phone calls. Ruddy met with the league and worked out a compromise involving script previews and removing the word 'mafia' entirely.

Copollo actually used a real horse's head procured from a local dogfood company to bring reality to the gross scene where a Holywood director wakes up in the morning to find the head of his prized racehorse in his bed, at his feet. It was part of 'an offer he can't refuse' to get Don Corleone's godson a big role in a movie.
Copollo habitually used his own family members in his movies. His sister, Talia Shire, played Don Corleone's daughter Connie and his own daughter Sofia was the baby used in the baptisimal scene with AI Pacino towards the end. In interview he said that he cast Diane Keaton in the role of Kay, the 'straight laced' girlfriend to Michael, because he felt she was 'so eccentric and kind-of weird' that she'd breathe life into the character.

Music: "The Great Gig In The Sky" by Pink Floyd and Clare Torry

Pink Floyd's album 'Dark Side of the Moon' was released on March $1^{\text {st }}$ 1973. The album's release culminated nearly two years of material development, public performance and rehearsals. It is listed as No. 3 best selling album of all time, with approximately 50 million certified copies sold, beaten only by Michael Jackson's 'Thriller' and AC/DC/s 'Back in Black'. It was Pink Floyd's greatest hit and launched them to Super Group status internationally.

In 1971 bassist and lead songwriter Roger Waters proposed the band write a new album of material for an upcoming tour that would be based on a single theme, the pressures the band endure as touring artists, dealing with the (recent) mental health problems of founder member Syd Barrett. Along with new music compositions, they would 'gear-up' with a highly technical stage show using advanced sounding mixing, lighting and special effects equipment. Work started in a garden shed kitted out as a recording room, progressed to a rehearsal warehouse owned by the Rolling Stones and on to what is now Abbey Road Studios for recording. But before committing to final recordings, they toured for almost a year playing and continuously tuning the songs which they played in the same order as they would eventually appear on the album.
'The Great Gig In The Sky' started as a chord sequence composed by piano player Richard Wright which was played live with a voice-over of bible readings and quotes from conservative religious leaders of the time. It wasn't until January 1973, 2 months before the album's final release, the band asked a London session singer to improvise a vocal track over the piano and slide guitar. The singer was Clare Torry and she was paid $£ 30$ standard flat fee for the session. She got the impression that they didn't like what she came up with and left thinking it would be dropped. It wasn't until the album's release that she heard her vocal track.
Listening to the song now, the vocal is the backbone of the song, creating a haunting impression beautifully countered by the simple piano chord progression and guitar emphasis. It wasn't until a lawsuit much later, in 2005, that Torry's artistic contribution was recognized and she was compensated for her vocal composition rights. Since then, she is always credited as a cowriter.
