## Jamil Hassan: "An Afghan Interpreter at The Fall of Kabul"

There was a good turnout for the June lunch that provided a great opportunity to catch up with longtime friends. The birthday boys who won the raffles and will receive free lunches are Paul Russell for May and Harry Sherinian for June.
Our June speaker, John Doolittle, told a fascinating story of his family's experience during Iran's political and violent transition from the Imperial State of Iran led by the Shah of Iran to the theocracy of the Islamic Republic led by the Ayatollah Khomeini. This was a true story of what happens to regular people in a foreign country just trying to do their jobs.
Our July speaker is Jamil Hassan. Mr. Hassan is an

Afghan interpreter who worked with Italian, American and other NATO forces when those forces fought in the Afghanistan war. He will describe how it felt to have to flee his home country with his wife and daughter, even though he never wanted to leave his country because he had freedom, democracy, prosperity, and a good life. But his family's life irrevocably changed when a political decision was made to withdraw all American and NATO forces from Afghanistan. Mr. Hassan will describe his duties as an interpreter and his harrowing ordeal that risked the lives of his family when he had to leave his homeland.

He lived at Tao House in the hills above Danville from 1936-194, where he authored many notable works including "Long Day's Journey into Night" and "The Iceman Cometh." "Anna Christie" premiered in the 1920s, and evolved to become one of O'Neill's most popular works, and one of his only two comedies.

Book Group \#1 will discuss the following books at Orinda Books at 10.15 on the following dates:

- Monday, July 24..."Elephant Company" by Vicki Croke
- Monday, August 28..."Horse" by Geraldine Brooks

Book Group \#1 met on Monday, June 26 at Orinda Books to discuss "Sapiens, A Brief History of Humankind" by Yuval Harari. The book was ambitious, to say the least, covering our species from the big bang to today's onset of artificial intelligence. The titles of the four parts, [Cognitive Revolution, Agricultural Revolution, Unification of Humankind,
and Scientific Revolution] give some idea of the scope of this $\sim 400$-page book. "Thought provoking " was one of the most frequent phrases applied to the book with one SIR giving it a perfect 5.0 and another a 4.9. The average was 4.25 stars.
Richard Black led the discussion with Nick Bowles, Dick Kauffman, Mac McLaughlin, Mike Schneider, Richard White, Paul Freitas, Larry Setren, Richard Rossland and John Riordan.

## Book Group 2 <br> Scott Clark

Seven Book Club 2 members met June 15 to discuss The Fall of the Roman Empire by Peter Heather.
The title is self explanatory. The author relates the story of how Europe's barbarians, the Huns, Goths \& Vandals, transformed by centuries of contact with Rome on every possible level, eventually pulled the empire apart. He shows first how the Huns overturned existing strategic balance of power on Rome's European frontiers to force the Goths and others to seek refuge inside the empire. This prompted two generations of struggle, during which new barbarian coalitions, formed in response to Roman hostility, brought the Roman west to its knees.

The author is considered a leading authority on the late Roman Empire. He argues convincingly that the Roman Empire was not on the brink of social or moral collapse. What brought it to an end were the barbarians.
This book reads like a dense academic text book.

Beyond the facts presented, no story here. A high level of prior knowledge and interest in the Roman Empire would be helpful to digest this book. We had two members that came close to meeting this criteria. We rated the book 2.4/5
